PUBLIC WORKS BILL TO REQUIRE NEW TAXATION

Washington, May 15 (AP)—Speaker Rainey said today after a White House conference in which congressional leaders participated, that President Roosevelt would suggest "several forms of taxation" in the public works message he will send to congress Wednesday.

The speaker said, however, that no particular form of taxation would be recommended in the message and that the form of a levy to raise \$200,000,000 yearly would be left to congress.

He said one \$200,000,000 would be used to amortize and pay interest on the bond issue contemplated to pay for public works projects amounting to approximately \$3,300,000,000.

Members of the house ways and means and senate finance committees participated in the discussion at the White House with the president.

They were instructed by George N. Peek, chief administration of the farm act, "to agree among themselves" and submit the result to him.

TRY FARM LAW ON MILK ISSUE

Washington, May 15 (AP)—In what may lead to the first tangible result of the new farm law, representatives of producers and processors of fluid milk who supply the Chicago Metropolitan area today sought to complete a trade agreement to bring about a better and more stable price to both producers and dealers.

DR. CARTWRIGHT PASSES AWAY

Dr. Richard Cartwright, head of Willamette sanitarium for the past 25 years, prominent physician and surgeon, died at his home here Sunday at the age of 82 years.

Dr. Cartwright was born July 9, 1851, at Hamilton, Canada, coming to the United States when 5 years of age. In 1888 Dr. Cartwright moved to Oregon and in 1900 established the Willamette sanitarium, acting as head of that institution until his last illness.

Coming to Salem in 1899, Dr. Cartwright the following year built the sanitarium which he operated until the time of his death, although during the past three or four years he had been forced to turn over active operation to others.

Surviving Dr. Cartwright are his widow, Florence Cartwright, and three children: Mrs. Chester Smith, Prosserville, Cal., Mrs. Brazer Small, Salem, and Miss Florence Cartwright, Portland, a brother, George Cartwright, of McMinnville, and a sister, Mrs. J. C. Beard of Decatur, Iowa.
