SCIENCE SAYS FAMOUS LAKE MIGHT GO DRY

Salt Lake City, Utah. (IP) — Great Salt Lake, the second largest "dead sea" of the world, will become extinct, if industry and farming continues to prevent water from flowing into its three sources.

Much of the water which would naturally go into these sources is now being used for agricultural and industrial purposes.

The lake, now covering 1,750 square miles, is dropping yearly. The salt content remains around 23 per cent, which is from four to six times as salty as the seas. It is fed from three small rivers, the Weber and Bear rivers on the Weber and Bear rivers on the north and east ends, and the Jordan on the south. It has no outle

dan on the south. It has no outer into any ocean.

For the last seven years, its depth has decreased five feet, some claim, however, that the decrease is periodically in seven-year limits, and that the water gradually rises during the next seven years.
