

SOUTH SANTIAM BRIDGE PROJECT TO START SOON

Salem—Although awarding of the contract by the state highway commission for a bridge over the South Santiam river near the old Sanderfoot site has been somewhat delayed, it is believed that work on the proposed structure will start as soon as practicable.

"We have assurances the work will be completed during the present calendar year," Judge D. O. Woodworth stated in Albany a short time ago. "It was originally believed that work would start about July 1, but it is now understood that it may be deferred slightly later."

According to specifications received recently by the Linn county court, the new bridge will be 774 feet in length, to include the approaches. The old bridge, which was swept away by high water about a year ago, was about 675 feet long.

Judge Woodworth stated that some of the material in the old bridge at Jefferson will be utilized in the construction of the crossing on the South Santiam. The width will be 30 feet, which exceeds that of the old bridge by four feet, he added. It is considered that this will adequately take care of traffic on this road for an indefinite period.

The state highway commission, which is paying a third of the cost of construction, is reported to have granted the request of the Linn county court to include in the contract the stipulation that all labor on the bridge, other than the carpenter and his assistants, shall be residents of Linn county. The total cost of the structure is estimated at \$35,000.
