Silverton—Among the recommendations of the local 4-L's voted to place before the semi-annual convention of the boards of the organizations as they convene in Portland May 22, are:

Minimum wage scale, 50 cents per hour, six hour day and 36 hour week. Reduction of dues to 25 cents per month for employees and operators and all employees dues to remain with local consolidation of the 12 districts into four with four board of director members—two employees and two employers from each district and a total board membership of 16.

Retention of citizenship restrictions as at present. Change membership pledge to an agreement.

Elimination of commercial memberships.

Change made of district board to district council.

Elimination of the fall meeting of the board of directors.

Elimination of regular meetings with special meetings of the district council.

Change of dates of district conventions from October to April.

Elimination of holdover provisions in the board elections.

Inclusion of magazine publication charges in dues.
