WATER SUPPLY AT SILVERTON IS MADE PURE

Silverton—E. L. McClary, superintendent of the water commission, was deputized by District Attorney Trindle Tuesday to bring to justice owners of stock in the region of Silver Creek near the intake of the Silverton city water supply.

When the question first came up concerning the pollution of the water from the carcasses of animals left too near the creek for sanitary safety, during the latter part of February, the use of water was discontinued from Silver creek and water from the Abiqua used.

The owners were notified several times of the law violation in not disposing properly of the dead cattle, but up to Wednesday, had disregarded the warning, according to reports. With sufficient rains the water supply for the city is adequate from the Abiqua, but not so if the weather settles. The Silver Falls Timber company will soon need an additional supply and the city must depend on Silver creek.

The owners were given until Thursday to comply with the court's order, after which arrests will be made if the carcasses are not properly disposed of. Considerable labor will be necessary to properly cleanse the intake.

The city, county and state health officers are taking the case over, and all report the need of purification is imminent.
