

MEMORIAL DAY OBSERVED FOR LEGION GROUP

Silverton—Rev. Father John Dunn, pastor of the local parish of St. Paul's Catholic church, was the principal speaker at the forenoon Memorial day services held at the armory Tuesday with C. J. Towe, commander of Delbert Reeves Post No. 7, American Legion, in general charge of program and parade arrangements.

Father Dunn's topic was "This Memorial Day." He dwelt on the ideals of prudence, calm and sympathy of Lincoln and placed these ideals and the need of them today in a beautifully given oration. He stressed the time element as Lincoln's Memorial of Words marked the 70 year median from Washington and the 70 year period to the present. Tender tribute was paid in thought to the veterans of the three wars. Not one of the Civil War group was present. M. L. Latham who is the last survivor of the Grand Army of the Republic in Silverton, was unable to attend.

Seated on the stage were Mrs. C. D. Hartman, president of the local Woman's Relief Corps; Mrs. Frances Gougle, department patriotic instructor; Mrs. Alta Hall, president of the auxiliary; C. J. Towe, commander of the Legion; Rev. Father Dunn; and Alfred and J. DeSousa. Others who appeared on the program were Hal Campbell as director of the Silverton school band in patriotic selections; Devere Pennington leading the audience in "America" and "The Star Spangled Banner"; invocation and benediction by Rev. C. J. Hall of the Methodist Episcopal church; Devere Pennington vocal solo, singing "The Old Refrain"; by Kehler, accompanied by Mrs. Fern Davenport; General Logan's Memorial Day Order, read by Nellie Barkhurst; Lincoln's Gettysburg address given as a reading by Evelyn Stewart; vocal solo, O. Dry Those Tears, Del Rio, sung by John Overlund, accompanied by Mrs. Arthur Dahl, and the forming of the parade from the steps of the armory.

An impressive service was held at the bridge over Silver creek as the parade halted, in honor of the veterans who died at sea. Members of the Woman's Relief Corps were in charge of these ceremonies. Special honor was paid the veterans of land battles at the Silverton city cemetery.

In the parade were the school band, Company "C", of the National Guards, Boy and Girl Scouts, World War veterans, Spanish War veterans, War mothers, Woman's Relief Corps, Auxiliary and various other organizations.

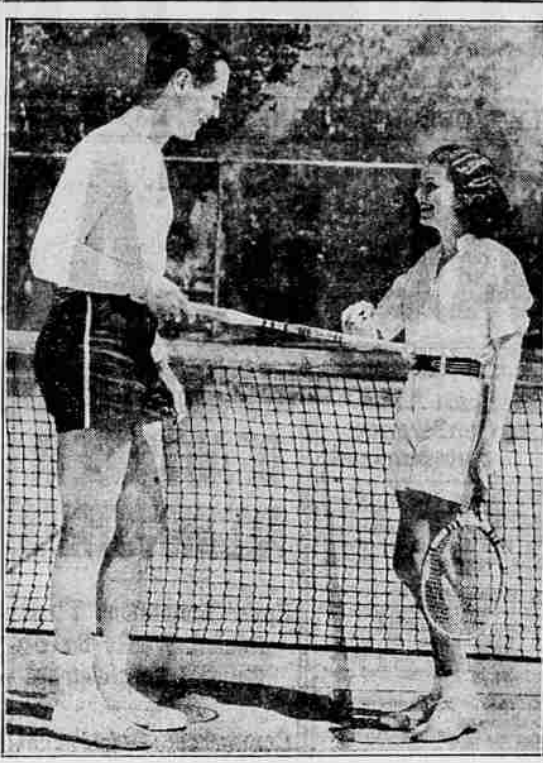

Independence Club Now Making Arrangements For Its Annual Flower Event

Independence—The annual Garden club flower show will be June 12 afternoon and evening, and the displays will be made in the city park at the end of "C" street, where long rows of tables will be arranged to accommodate the entries. Plans are underway now for a large and interesting exhibit according to Mrs. C. G. Irvine, general chairman. The club is expecting entries from all parts of the valley, and being located in a park will add attractiveness to the colorful display.

All types of single plants and group displays are on the entry list, including rock and miniature gardens, shadow boxes to be electrically brilliant in the evening, aquatic plants, and tree and shrub groupings. An added feature of the show will be a program both afternoon and evening. An exhibit of novelty features, antiques, and all sorts of old relics will have a place in the show, but these exhibits will not be judged.

The following include rules for the exhibit and a classification of entries: Any individual in the Willamette valley is invited to participate in the flower show; all Garden club members regardless of office are entitled to enter. All flowers must be grown in exhibitors' own garden and exhibitor must furnish own containers. Exhibits must be in by 1:30 o'clock June 12. Three ribbons will be awarded in each class. Sweepstakes will be awarded to exhibitor having highest number of points.

Section A—Horticultural, class 1—Cut perennials—A, best display of perennials from one garden in one container; B, best display of a collection of hybrid varieties of one family as poppies, dianthus, campanula.

Class 2—Pansy, best display of pansies in bowl or basket.

Class 3—Geranium, A, best single stalk; B, best display three stalks; three different colors in one container.

Class 4—Angeltia (long spurred columbine), A, best display of five stalks in one container; B, best stalk or bowl of columbine.

Class 5—Ponionies (cut), A, best blossom in container; B, best collection of ponionies from one garden.

Class 6—Rose, A, best named rose in one container; B, best basket of roses; C, best display of five different varieties.

Class 7—Tis, A, best display of German iris, not less than five stems in one container; B, best display of Spanish or Dutch iris in one container.

Class 8—Suppurgione, best display of three or more stalks in one container.

Class 9—Wild flowers, most artistically arranged bouquet of wild flowers.

Class 10—Sweet peas, A, best bouquet of mixed sweet peas; B, best nine of mixed blossoms, one color in one container.

Class 11—Cut annuals, best display of annuals from one garden in one container.

Class 12—Lilies, A, best blossom in one container; B, best display of lilies from one garden.

Section B—Aquatic plants—Class 1—Water lilies, A, best blossom in
