

50 YEAR OLD PAPERS FOUND BY BOY HOBBOES

Are newspapermen born or made? That is a question that has been discussed within the craft for a long time, and never answered with much satisfaction.

Most any editor will tell you he knows personally a lot of guys that ought to be in some other occupation. And it's certain that now and then you find clippings in strange places who ought to be newspapermen—simply because they know instinctively what makes good stuff for the readers. And that really is the only test for reporters.

Take now Tura Lindstrom and Herman Anderson, a couple of good-natured Scandinavian boys who are beating their way from California to Seattle. Call them hoboes if you want to. They won't object. Tura is a Swede and Herman a Norwegian. Tura came into the Journal office today with something he thought would be of interest to the customers. The man on the desk agreed.

It seems that Tura and Herman scout, either in a deserted and very old cabin near Oroville, Calif. Beneath a retting board in the floor Tura saw some papers, yellow with age. He pulled them out and looked them over.

One was an old newspaper containing an article about experiments being made with electric lights, and scolding at the idea. The others were business letters, invoices and a Western Union telegram, most of them dated more than 50 years ago. The telegram, from W. T. Ellis of Marysville to Perkins & Co. at Oroville, said: "No Early Rose potatoes to be had."

Perkins & Co., the letters indicate, had formerly been known as Perkins, Logan & Co. An invoice to that firm for a total sum of \$359.08 and dated November 9, 1878, was from Adams, McNeill & Co., 93 Front street, corner of L. San Francisco. "Dealers in Powder, Quicksilver, Fuse, Wines, Liquors and Tobaccoes." To the same Oroville firm from Page, Moore & Co., commission merchants at 211-213 Clay street, San Francisco, were several business letters, dated in 1880.

Hall, Luhrs & Co., 60 and 62 K street, Sacramento, on November 1, 1878, sent their bill for bacon, mackerel and some other articles, totaling \$305.09.

A letter from the Southern Belle Mining company of San Francisco was dated in 1884. And C. H. Street, secretary and land officer for the Immigration Association of California, wrote a letter soliciting D. K. Perkins for an exhibit at the Mechanics' Fair. One of the business letters acknowledged receipt of a payment of \$8000, and another of \$1500.

Lindstrom mentioned that he might be able to sell the papers for a quarter or so to someone who likes to collect old documents.

NEW SOCIETY IS LIKENED TO TECHNOS HERE

Rome (AP)—Mussolini has approved and Guglielmo Marconi, the inventor, soon will organize the Italian Technical state council, which resembles in some respects the technocratic body advanced recently in the United States.

This body was an outgrowth of the National Research council which has been in existence for some time, but it had not been generally realized how important was the work being undertaken by the council until Senator Marconi made his report. From this report it can be seen

that the council shortly is to have this further development which will give it greater advisory powers.

The purpose of this new body, is to recruit competent technical men to make decisions on problems of a scientific or technical character. What this amounts to, it is stated, is a first application of technocratic principles to government.

The Technical council will not be able to impose its decisions, which will have to pass through the ordinary effective. At the same time, it is understood the members of the state technical council will have such high expert and personal authority that their decisions are not likely to be easily overruled.

The research council proposes during 1933 to organize exhibitions and competitions for instruments and machinery made in Italy in order to help their sale and illustrate their good points.

A commission presided over by

Admiral Pession of the state radio services and Senator Garbasso is engaged in organizing these exhibitions and competitions.

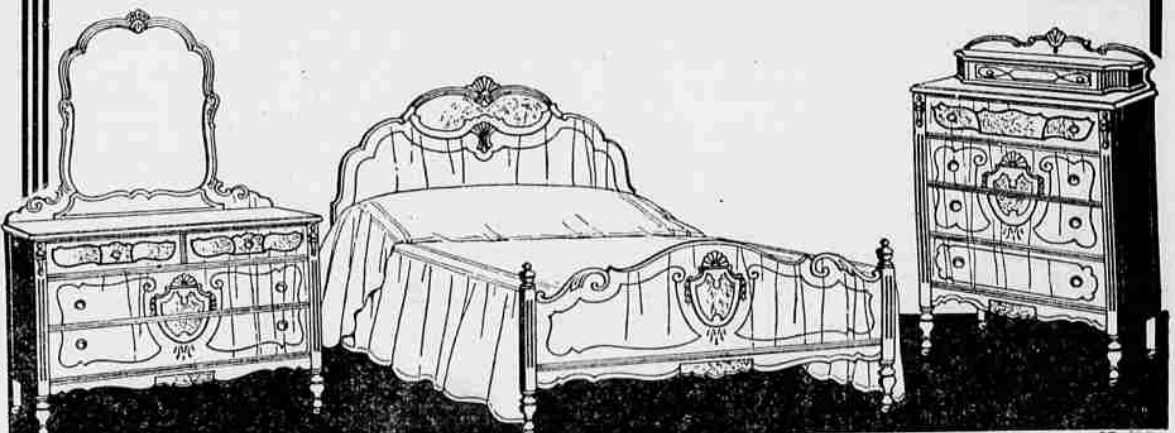
