Flower Show Opens Friday

Extensive plans are being completed by the committees in charge of the Willamette Valley Flower show, which opens at Marion Square Friday to last through Sunday. A typical Dutch village and tea garden will be under the direction of Mrs. Lender Pearmine and Mrs. Mark McCallister. Commercial exhibits will be housed in the picturesque village. The Curiosity shop, under the direction of Mrs. Ernest Leifer, will be another distinctive feature of the show.

The various classes of the decorative section are as follows:

- CLASS I—FLOWER ARRANGEMENT:**
1. Artistic arrangement in short stemmed flowers in bowl or vase.
 2. Artistic arrangement of short stemmed flowers in basket.
 3. Artistic arrangement of medium height flowers in bowl or vase.
 4. Artistic arrangement of medium height flowers in basket.
 5. Artistic arrangement of all flowers in bowl or vase.
 6. Artistic arrangement of tall flowers in basket.
 7. Artistic arrangement of flowers together to be over 18 inches.
 8. Flower arrangement in pewter or silver container.
 9. Flower arrangement in modernistic manner.
 10. Flower arrangement in tones and shades of one color only.
 11. Flower arrangement in glass bottle.
 12. Vase, container, under 6 inches.
 13. Flower arrangement in pair of vases, containers under 6 inches.
 14. Best old fashioned flower arrangement.
 15. Best Japanese flower arrangement.
 16. Flower arrangement using national colors of any country, color of bowl to be part of scheme. Name of country must be given.
 17. a. Artistic arrangement of vegetables in a suitable container (tin tray, wooden or pottery bowl, basket, etc.).
 - b. Artistic arrangement of vegetables and fruit, or fruit alone, combination with flowers and foliage permitted.

- CLASS II—SHADOW BOX ARRANGEMENT:**
1. Shadow box. Flower arrangement displayed in a picture frame. Accessories permitted.

- CLASS III—TABLE ARRANGEMENT:**
1. Occasional table with flower arrangement and any other accessories such as book, tray, etc.
 2. Children's party table.
 3. Breakfast table for three.
 4. Luncheon table for two or four.
 5. Tea table. Number restricted.

- CLASS IV—MINIATURE GARDEN MODEL:**
1. Miniature garden to be shown in box or flat. Outside dimensions not to exceed 24 x 36 inches.

- CLASS V—OUTDOOR GARDEN FEATURE:**
1. Most effective outdoor garden picture using garden feature such as pool, seat, birdhouse, etc., together with suitable plants.
 2. Outdoor tea nook.
