FIND BURIED AUTO ON MOUNTAINSIDE

Vancouver, Wash., June 1 (AP)—A new kind of mystery confronted the sheriff of Clark county today. It centered around the discovery yesterday of an automobile which for eight years had lain buried in a shallow pit on the northeast slope of Green Mountain.

The automobile, a large, expensive touring car, was obviously new when it was hidden in the pit. The entire chassis had been saved in two. The top, wheels and tires were missing. The car bore 1925 Washington license plates, No. 151-493. The car (a Cadillac) was sold new that year.

Workers who were clearing land on the slopes of Green Mountain made the discovery yesterday. Sheriff R. E. McCrory, who has communicated with license bureau officials at Olympia in an attempt to solve the mystery, said those who have worked on the case have found no explanation as to why the car was buried in the lonely spot.

LOUIS HOWE DENIES RECOMMENDING KITS

Washington, June 1 (AP)—Louis Howe, senator from Oregon, today told the senate military committee he had not suggested to Robert Fechner, director of the conservation corps, the purchase of kits from the Bevier company of New York.

Appearing before the committee at his own request, as a result of statements before senators yesterday by Fechner, Howe was asked by Senator Reed (R., Pa.) "Did you direct Fechner to make the purchase from this company?"

"I did not," Howe replied. "It is certainly not so and that is the impression I want to clear up." Howe presented a letter written to him today by Fechner. It said Howe had telephoned Fechner that he had been shown toilet kits by a salesman and that he had informed Fechner that if the value was all right, Fechner had the authority to buy them.

INSPECT BRIDGES ON COAST HIGHWAY

Leslie Scott, chairman of the state highway commission, accompanied by R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer and C. B. McCullough, bridge engineer, left here today for an inspection of several of the proposed Oregon coast bridges. They were bound for Reedsport to look over the proposed span site there.

Carle Washburn of Eugene, member of the commission, will join them there. Senator Joe E. Dunne, chairman of the senate roads and highway committee at the last session, also accompanied the party.

PEIRCE BLAMED IN POWER FIRM REPLY

The Central Public Service corporation has filed its answers in circuit court to the complaints of Gundmundur Thorsteinsson and John W. Fishburn in regard to sales of stock to the plaintiffs in that corporation.

The defense of the corporation will be that it sold its stock outright to Albert E. Peirce company of Chicago and that any purchases made by the plaintiffs were made from that company and not from the Central Public Service corporation.

Change of attorneys for the corporation was also made in the case of Jarry J. DeFrang and J. S. Moltzer to appear for the company in place of Dey, Hampson & Nelson.

PLEDGE OF DRY TOO FORCEFUL

The secretary of state's office today refused to accept a filing for prohibition convention delegate by P. C. Heffron, 1159 Mill St., Eugene. Heffron's fee was returned to him, with the statement that his pledge did not correspond with that required by law.

Candidates are required, on filing for the ballot, to pledge themselves to vote either wet or dry, as their consciences may be. Heffron marked out that portion of the filing blank and substituted the following: "I pledge myself to vote against ratification of said article of amendment and to do all in my power to prevent such ratification. I further pledge myself that under no circumstances will I vote for a consent to the repeal of the existing 18th amendment to the constitution of the United States of America."

David O'Hara, election chief, was puzzled as no other candidate had altered the pledge, so he consulted Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle. The attorney general ruled that the Eugene man's filing could not be legally accepted.

Lane county is entitled to six delegates to the convention. Two wet and one dry have filed.

CONSULATE ROCKED BY MUKDEN BOMBS

Mukden, Manchuria, June 1 (AP)—Grounds of the British consulate general were rocked tonight by the explosion of two crudely-fashioned bombs which had been planted on the premises.

Although windows were shattered, no one was injured.

Another bomb later was discovered at the railway station. Authorities believed it was timed to explode upon the arrival of a Japanese "Good-will" mission bound for Changchun, the capital.

Bombing of the British consular offices was the second attempted. A bomb was found on the premises two weeks ago. A second explosion was later found on a window of the American consulate.

DOLLY VARDEN ATE RATTLET, WATER DOG

Bend, Ore., June 1 (AP)—From Paxton Ripples on the lower Deschutes river near Mecca, today came one of the strangest fish stories of the 1933 season. It recounted as a fact that a nine-pound Dolly Varden trout captured and ate a rattlesnake and then topped off the meal with a 10-inch water dog.

The rattler and the water dog were found in the interior of the huge trout when the fish was dressed by Warm Springs Indians. The snake bore two rattles and a button.

PENDLETON BANK PAYS R. F. C. LOAN

Washington, June 1 (AP)—The re-construction finance corporation authorized loans to four Oregon banks and trust companies during April, it was announced today. Each loan was less than \$6,000.

The corporation said the First National bank of Pendleton had withdrawn or cancelled an authorized loan of \$478,000.

The loans authorized included: First National bank of Tillamook, \$5,700; First National bank of Hood River, \$5,380.

FRISCO HAS FIRE

San Francisco, June 1 (AP)—Fire, which caused damage estimated by firemen at \$80,000, swept plants of the Forsyth Hardware company and Acme Planning works, adjoining, here last night.

Fire Chief Charles Brennan said he believed the fire was incendiary.

ROOSEVELT TRIPLETS

Potomac, Okla., June 1 (AP)—Franklin, Delano, and Roosevelt arrived in quick succession today. They are triplets born to Ed and Virgie Evans, negroes married 11 years and now possessed of ten offspring, including a pair of twins.

The state board of control will open new bids June 22 for supplying a steam boiler to the state penitentiary. Previous bids were all rejected because of their involved nature and the board will attempt this time to make specifications more clear. It is estimated the boiler will cost about \$15,000.

Rise In Hog Value Held Hopeful Sign

Washington, June 1 (AP)—The marked rise in hog prices during May today was cited by the bureau of agriculture economics as the "most encouraging economic development experienced by corn belt farmers in four years."

It predicted that hog slaughter during the five months, May to September, will be slightly larger than in the same period last year but added that "the present reduction in storage holdings of hog products compared with a year ago will more than offset any increase in slaughter."

LEWIS SEEKS PLACE ON POWER BOARD

Filing received this morning from John H. Lewis of Portland brought candidates for state power commissioner to four. Three filed late Wednesday.

Lewis is former state engineer and served in the 1933 legislature as a representative from Multnomah county. Candidates filing yesterday afternoon were Morton Tompkins, Grand Island; Peter Zimmerman, McMinnville and Albert Slaughter, Portland. They are leaders in the state senate, which sponsored the power bill passed by the last legislature.

Election of the three power commissioners hinges on the approval of the powers bill, which referendum petitioners are now being circulated. Deadline for filings was midnight Wednesday. It is possible filings of some other candidates may be in the mail, as a number of blanks were issued by the secretary of state's office.

BANKS UNDERGOES SURGEON'S KNIFE

Eugene, Ore., June 1 (AP)—Llewellyn A. Banks, convicted Meador slayer, today was to be operated on at Pacific Christian hospital, where he has been confined since his collapse May 22.

The operation will be performed by C. D. Donahue. The 62-year-old former editor has been suffering from organic trouble. He underwent a major operation at Ashland last fall.

Banks, although cheered over the prospect, requested his wife, who is in Meador attending to financial matters of his estate, not to be present for the operation because of the nervous strain. Success of the operation will rest in the hands of God," the former publisher told friends.

M'NARY WORKS TO KEEP SCHOOL HERE

Portland, June 1 (AP)—Senator Charles McNary was to have a conference today with Indian Commissioner Collier and Secretary of the Interior Ickes in an attempt to obtain a modification of the recent ruling which ordered the closing of the Chemawa Indian school near Salem.

A special dispatch to the Oregonian last night from Washington said:

"The Oregon senator can find \$175,000 he believes he can have Chemawa continued as an educational school. Unless McNary locates the necessary funds, the Chemawa school must be abandoned July 1.

MITCHELL CLAIM UNDER ATTACK

New York, June 1 (AP)—The government today vigorously attacked Charles E. Mitchell's contention that \$886,666 he received from a huge "management funds" of the National City company in 1929 was merely a "loan" and not subject to taxation as income.

As the trial of Mitchell, former chairman of the National City bank and its affiliate, the National City company, accused of dodging \$850,000 in income taxes for 1929 and 1930, proceeded, United States Attorney George Z. Medalle drew from witnesses a dramatic story of the setting up of a \$2,000,000 management fund and its split-up by the principal officers of the institution.

Frank J. Maguire, assistant secretary of the National City company identified the minutes of directors' meetings at which the fund was greater, and Medalle read to the jury the terms by which the fund was to be distributed among the more fortunate executives.

The directors decided to set up the fund in January, 1927. They ordered set up a "reserve account" out of current earnings, amounting to eight per cent after the net operating expenses and the net profit for taxes, depreciation and other reserves had been deducted, plus 20 per cent of "remaining current earnings."

SICK YOUTH FOUND IN HOBO JUNGLE

Oakland, Calif., June 1 (AP)—A hobo "jungle" is no place to be sick, Henry Johnson, 15 year old wanderer from Marshfield, Ore., admitted today as he had full justice to the fare at Highland hospital.

He was found, ill and half starved, in a hobo hangout where he had wandered after a bad cold made him too sick to walk about town. Fellow hoboes tried to help him, but they had little to eat, and he subsisted for days, on a few sips of coffee and a few bites of mulligan.

Police were trying to locate his father, Warren Johnson, believed to be on a ranch near Sacramento.

On motion of District Attorney W. H. Trindle the charge in justice court against Charles Burgett was dismissed Thursday. He was accused of threatening to commit a felony, the alleged threat being to do bodily harm to Mrs. Josephine Burgett, his step-mother. The dismissal was on grounds of insufficient evidence.

SAVED VACATIONS

Coffeyville, Kan. (AP)—For twelve years Clarence Hobbs, a mail carrier here, has walked his route every day without taking advantages of the convenient "sick leave" privilege of the postal department. Figuring up, he found he could take four months off to be sick sometime now, and the government would pay him for every day. He has 120 days to his credit.

DAVIS EXPLAINS ARMS ATTITUDE

Geneva, June 1 (AP)—Desiring to prevent any erroneous belief that Europe can count in advance upon the United States participating in punishment of a nation violating the disarmament convention now in negotiation, Norman H. Davis, American ambassador at large, today explained the attitude of his government to the arms conference.

Mr. Davis said the United States was wholeheartedly for supervision of armaments but was unable to accept the implied obligation that it would join other nations in bringing pressure against a country violating the arms agreement.

He made it clear the Washington government was strong for moral pressure but could make no promise before hand to punish anybody.

A revolt by the small powers, which protested against adjournment of the disarmament conference, ended today in a compromise by which the steering committee will sit during a conference recess to draft a revised arms convention, and Arthur Henderson, the chairman, will have power to convoke the delegates for special negotiations.

The French introduced amendments strengthening the supervision of armaments. These amendments would provide for regular inspection in every country and would make persons giving information about violations of the arms convention immune from prosecution.

PECORA REPLIES TO HACKETT'S CHARGES

Washington, June 1 (AP)—John C. Hackett, describing himself as former special deputy police commissioner of New York, called on senate banking committee members today to file charges against Ferdinand Pecora, committee counsel in the investigation of J. P. Morgan and Co.

He left with several members of the committee a pamphlet criticizing Pecora's handling of the "Dot" King murder in 1923 when he (Pecora) was assistant district attorney.

Pecora told newspapermen Hackett could "go the bottom" of his service as far as he was concerned.

He said he had withheld the name of John Kearnsley Mitchell, Philadelphia business man in connection with the King case temporarily at Mitchell's request.

The evidence showed, Pecora said, that Mitchell had nothing to do with the slaying.

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
