

EIGHTY SENIORS ARE GRADUATED FOR SILVERTON

Silverton—Dr. Burt Brown Barker, vice president of the University of Oregon, gave the commencement address to the 80 members of the Silverton high school graduating seniors Thursday evening at the Eugene Field auditorium. Practically 1500 people crowded the hall with many standing in the corridors.

Dr. Barker spoke on "Ideals." Superintendent Robert Goetz introduced the speaker as a Marion county product, telling of his living in Salem in the past years. Dr. Barker maintained that it is ideals were built alone on the mental standard, the mind will trick the body. That the spirit of faith and labor must co-mingle to produce the livable life. He closed with the thought that the daily grind of work was the truest ideal of humanity.

H. J. Kramer, principal of the high school, announced the scholarship. Vera Mae Zeigler won the Albany college scholarship. The honor of the T.N.T. bronze plaque placement went to Helen Davis and Eugene Hobart. This special honor is based on scholarship, leadership and character.

Superintendent Goetz gave a brief review of the history of the class during the 12 years of school. Out of the 73 who entered 12 years ago, only 20 appeared on the stage as graduates of their home school.

ACADEMY HOLDS SUMMER TERM
