Women do such baking as they can find ingredients for and do some family washing at the river's brink and mend children's clothes.

## DISTRICT TAX IS DECREASED

Jefferson—The 1933-34 budget for Jefferson school district No. 14 shows a considerable reduction from last year. The amount to be raised by taxes for the ensuing year is \$4470, as compared with \$5200.32 for 1932-33.

The general control allowance is reduced from last year's \$1702.50 to \$1370. Instruction reduced from \$5960 to \$4790. Operation of plant from \$940 to \$810. Maintenance and repair allowance at \$350 and charges at \$145 remain the same. Emergency service has been increased this year from \$300 to \$500.

The amount for debt service for the year 1933-34 is \$1100 more than the previous year; \$1000 has been included in the budget to apply on the principal of the warrants which amount to approximately \$6000 at the present time; \$400 is for interest on the warrants.

The annual school meeting of district No. 14 will be held at the school Monday, June 19 at 2 o'clock. One director to serve for three years and a clerk to serve for one year will be elected at this time.
