

SILVERTON AND SALEM JUNIORS CLASH WEDNESDAY

VISITORS PLAN TO USE SCHWAB AGAINST LOCALS

Whether the Salem junior baseball club is going to figure much in the Marion county championship series will likely be determined Wednesday afternoon on Olinger field when Coach Hank's youthful meet Silvertown at 4 o'clock. Desirably beaten last Saturday by Woodburn, apparently the strongest of the four teams competing, Salem will almost of necessity be forced to take the visitors into camp Wednesday in order to stay in the running. A pre-season victory over Silvertown would indicate that this is not an impossibility.

So far as is known now no new faces will be added to the Salem lineup and Penny or Gatchell will likely do the mound work. After a shaky start the defense of the Salem players was all that could be expected Saturday. However, on offense, the local juniors could do little with the offerings of Stevens. It is expected Silvertown will throw Schwab against Salem Wednesday afternoon. This boy, a brother of the pitcher who made legion baseball history two or three years ago, performed for Silvertown high during the past season and was a consistent winner.

Last Sunday Silvertown defeated Stayton 15 to 10 with Coomer doing the pitching and with Laughlin behind the bat. Champ was on the mound for Stayton. Stayton took a six to one lead during the first three innings but could not retain the advantage.

Outside of the mound department, it is believed Salem is fully as strong as Silvertown and a much closer game than was played last Sunday is expected to develop.

DEMPSEY WORKS BUT MAXS REST UP FOR BATTLE

New York, June 6 (AP)—Trained to the minute, Max Baer and Max Schmeling can afford to take things easy until they square off for their 15-round heavyweight duel in the Yankee stadium Thursday night but there was no rest immediately in sight for Promoter Jack Dempsey.

There's no doubt Jack has worked harder the last couple of months in his new role than he ever did when he was getting ready to defend his heavyweight championship a few years ago and the end had not yet come today.

Financially the bout seemed certain of success but there were a thousand and one details to be ironed out before Dempsey could breathe a sigh of relief and let the show go on. The major task confronting him was the converting of these two into a tight arena. As soon as the New York Yankees completed their doubleheader with Boston today, Dempsey planned to move in a small army of workmen to set up the ring and arrange the seats. Once that is done to his satisfaction, all he'll need to worry about is the weather.

Tentatively at least Dempsey has been promised fine weather. James H. Scarr, head of the New York weather bureau, says Thursday "probably will be fair."

If it is, indications were a crowd of close to 60,000 would pour into the stadium for the match. Dempsey said yesterday he had \$100,000 cash in hand and another \$50,000 in reservations. The expected last-minute rush for tickets was expected to send the receipts close to \$300,000.

Betting on the bout has been very light with Schmeling a steady 2 to 1 choice. Despite the rather general opinion that the big Californian will be quite a handful, the experts still are disposed in the German's favor.

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Groves Thrives On Hard Mound Work; Called On Ten Times In 17 Days

On Bob Grove's thin shoulders rest almost the entire burden of keeping the Philadelphia Athletics in the American league pennant race, but the crack southpaw seems to be thriving on work. An apparent "throw back" to such baseball iron men as Ed Walsh and Joe McGinnity, the lanky ace of Connie Mack's disappointing pitching staff took the mound yesterday for the 10th time in 17 days, scattered Washington's 10 hits as the A's won 7-4 and hung up his fifth successive victory in that short space of time.

Called off the relief pitching job that put his name in the A's box score nine times in 11 contests, Grove, starting a game for the first time since May 6, had no worries after his teammates solved Al Crowder for five runs in the third inning. And just to make it complete he contributed a home run and single to the A's 14-run assault. Fred Schulte's double and

home run accounted for three of the Senators' tallies.

Meanwhile the Chicago White Sox continued their terrific bombardment on St. Louis pitching, brushed aside the Browns, 14-7, and moved into third place, a game and a half behind the Senators and three percentage points ahead of the Cleveland Indians. The pale hose blasted 23 hits off the combined deliveries of George Blaeholder, Sam Gray and Rolland Stiles, four going to Evar Swanson, fleet outfielder. Whitlow Wyatt, making his first start since he was traded to the Sox by Detroit, was walked for 10 hits, including home runs by Carl Reynolds and Debs Garms, but was fairly effective except in the ninth when the Browns scored three runs.

Vic Frasier, for whom Wyatt was traded, made his debut for Detroit but failed to go the route although the Tigers eventually emerged with an 8-7 triumph. Frasier went out at the end of five innings with the score 5-4 against him and Vic Sorrell received credit for the victory earned by a two run rally in the ninth. In that frame, with two men on, Charlie Gehringer's fourth hit of the game sent in the tying run while the deciding tally came over on Stone's long outfield fly.

Rain halted the only National league game of the day with the St. Louis Cardinals leading the Cincinnati Reds, 2-0, after three and one-half innings.

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GOLFERS TUNE UP FOR SERIES

Chicago, June 6 (AP)—With only one day intervening before the start of the national open golf tournament, the leading players tramped over the North Shore course again today in an effort to adjust their shots to its treacherous traps and hazards.

Where several weeks ago it was thought a score of 280 or 287 would be necessary to win the tournament, the impression was gaining strength that any score under 290 would win the title. Many golfers who have played the newly trapped and lengthened course were predicting no one would play four par rounds of 72 for a 288 total.

More than 25 of the leaders played the course yesterday and only one—Henry Cuici, the little eastern

professional with powerful wrists—was able to shatter par. He was one over par 36 going out, but came back in 33, three under par, the best 9-hole round made on the course in 10 days for a total of 70, two under par.

Three others equaled par 72—Billy Burke, 1931 champion, MacDonald Smith, who is decidedly on his game, and Sonny Rouse, a local player. Johnny Goodman, Omaha, Neb., runner-up for the national amateur title, established himself as a threat when he turned in a 73 in his first practice round.
