

VALLEY BANKS TAKE FORWARD STEPS MONDAY

Woodburn—A meeting of the depositors committee of 15 of the Bank of Woodburn was held at the city hall Monday night for the purpose of organization. Mayor W. H. Albany—Twenty-three thousand dollars in stock for the new bank in Albany was tentatively in sight yesterday as the first definite step in financing the proposed bank here. It was announced by the citizens committee which is in charge of raising the \$125,000 necessary to open the new bank and to release the old deposits in the restricted Albany State and First National banks.

The problem before the depositors is to finance a new bank and take over the liquid assets of the present banks as far as possible, or allow the banks to go into complete liquidation and also permit some large bank of Portland to establish a branch bank here.

M. C. Wilde, national bank examiner stationed at Portland has been selected by the treasury department to pass on the application for the proposed bank before final action is taken at Washington to grant the charter. The committee is to go to Portland Wednesday to confer with Wilde. It was announced.
