

SCHMELING SET FOR BRAVNY CALIFORNIA BOXER

DEMPSEY HOPES TO PACK CROWD INTO STADIUM

New York, June 7 (AP)—For the first time since he arrived in this country, perhaps for the first time in his career, Max Schmeling is being asked to give away chunks of weight to a young, tough rival, Max Baer, and on his success in solving that problem in the Yankee stadium tomorrow night rests his chance of becoming the first heavyweight champion in history to regain the title.

For if he whips the bravny Californian decisively in Jack Dempsey's first New York promotional venture, few experts doubt his ability to "take" either the aging Jack Sharkey or the mammoth Primo Carnera, who will meet for the title in Madison Square Garden's outdoor bowl in Long Island City June 29.

Even those ringworms who believe the 215 to 1 odds or better in Schmeling's favor are justified, agree that in Baer the German will be facing his stiffest test. The 210-pound Livermore, Calif., youngster has made tremendous progress in the last two years and his great strength and stamina, coupled with surprising speed in so big a man, make him a formidable foe for any heavyweight in the business.

The conviction has become general that whatever the outcome of their 15-round tussle, Baer and Schmeling offer a "natural" that will bring close to 60,000 fans into the big ball park.

Both fighters have completed training for the match and are waiting for the signal to swing into action. Baer left his Atlantic City camp for a private home in New York today but Schmeling planned to remain at Lake Swannanoa, N. J., until tomorrow, arriving in New York just before the weighing-in at 1 o'clock Thursday afternoon.

A steady stream of customers filing past the box office windows strengthened Dempsey's expectations of a crowd of 60,000 and receipts of nearly \$300,000 granting favorable weather.

Workmen, operating under Dempsey's supervision, were busy engaged in setting up the ring and arranging the seats today and all was to be in readiness by nightfall. The gates will be thrown open at 3 p. m. (E.S.T.) Thursday afternoon.

The first preliminary was scheduled for 7 p. m. (E.S.T.) and the main bout between 8:30 and 9 p. m. There will be no broadcast.

WONG BOCK BEATS YIDDISH WRESTLER

Portland, June 7 (AP)—Taking two straight falls, one of them on a foul, Wong Bock Cheung, Chicago Chinese, won the main event of last night's wrestling matches here from Abe Kaplan of New York. Cheung weighed 214 pounds and Kaplan, 210.

The Chinese was given the first fall in 25 minutes when Kaplan dropped him with an uppercut to the jaw and the referee called it a foul. Cheung took the second and deciding fall in 19 minutes with a Manchurian choke hold.

Richard Stahl, 218, Berlin, won the five-round semi-windup from Nore Jerlstrom, 215, Chicago, getting one fall. Larry Bennett, 171, Portland, and Heinie Olson, 72, Portland, went three rounds to a draw in the preliminary.

Dallas—With the completion of the school year this week Coach Oramel Shreve, his two assistants, Robert Kutch and Phillip Ford, and his group of high school athletes can look back on the season's achievements with a considerable amount of pride and satisfaction.

The representatives of the orange and black won championships in five distinct branches of sport including football, basketball, baseball, track and tennis.

The football team played eight games winning seven and losing one. In seven of the games they were not scored on and in all ran up a total of 99 points to their opponents' 19. The team will lose heavily through graduation, with no fewer than eight members completing their high school careers. The list is composed of Bill Cadle, Dean Cadle, Fred Lewis, Everett Hockett, Charles Laing, Irvin Peters, Karl Retner and Senter.

The second string, coached by Robert Kutch, played four games, winning one, losing one and tied two.

The basketball squad had a very successful year and played 19 games before it participated in the county tournament, in which it played three games. For the past four or five years the winner of the county tournament has always been defeated at least once in the competition but the Dallas squad upset this bogey by winning on every occasion they took the floor. As winners of the county championship they entered the district tournament and went down fighting desperately in the last minutes of an overtime game.

Just how Manager George Burns has made a winning club of his Seattle Indians no one seems to know, but that he has is evident from the results.

Deep in the league's lower regions three weeks ago, the Indians took a new lease on life and since then have played better than 500 baseball. Shoving across five runs in the eighth inning yesterday, the Burns' men beat the second-place Hollywood Stars 7-6 for their 12th victory in 21 starts.

The scrappy Seattle manager had a part in that winning rally, working a double squeeze along with Homer Summa to score on Coscare's bunt. Singles by Frank Cox, Mel Almada and Chick Ellsworth brought in the final three, Indian rallies. Burns contributed four singles to the Seattle attack. Herman Pillette went the route for the winners.

Los Angeles jumped on Herb Saunders, Sacramento rookie, in the tenth inning at the Sacramento capital to capture the series opener, 4-1. Relieving Tom Flynn at the beginning of the eighth, Saunders held the Angels scoreless for two innings and then wilted to let in four runs in the extra inning. Buck Newsom struck out 9 Senators in the 9-2-3 innings he pitched and received credit for the victory. Dorr Camilli homered for the Solons.

Jimmy Zinn, San Francisco veteran, welcomed the Oaks home to Emeryville with 5-hit hurling that cost them the series opener with the Seals, 3-1. Roy Joiner hurled evenly for Oakland and was responsible for only one of the three San Francisco scores. Harlin Pool's four-bagger in the ninth spoiled a shutout for Zinn.

Fists And Pop Bottles Fly As Reds And Cards Play Stormy Ball Game

The stormy scenes of this year's "aggressive" baseball, hitherto monopolized by the New York Yankees and Washington Senators, have reached the National league as an accompaniment to the St. Louis Cardinals' drive toward the top.

Some stiff resistance by the Cincinnati Reds, plus the "riding" of one player by a former teammate led the Cards into an embroglio yesterday that approached the best of the Senator-Yankee scraps.

The actual fighting was confined to a brief flurry between Jerome (Dizzy) Dean of the Cards and Paul Derringer of the Reds during batting practice but before the game was over, disputed decisions led to the ejection of two men, two pop bottles were tossed from the stands, one hitting Burgess Whitehead, Card sub, on the shoulder, and private police provided an escort from the park for the umpires.

The Cards won the game, 6-2, pounding out 16 hits while Bill Hallahan and Sylvester Johnson limited the Reds to four, and remained only five points behind the league leading New York Giants.

Derringer, traded by the Cards this spring, explained that Dean has been "riding the life" out of him and that the fight started when "Dizzy" said he meant "every word" he had said about Derringer. The big Cincinnati pitcher then uncorked a right hand swing that may or may not have landed on Dean's eye, depending upon who tells the story.

Except for the ejection of George Watkins of St. Louis over a protested decision in the fifth, things were quiet until the ninth when Jewel Eas, Cincinnati's acting manager, was chased for another protest. Then the bottle throwing and noisy objections to the officiating began.

The Giants held their slim lead by battering the Brooklyn Dodgers, 7-2, touching Owen Carroll for four runs in the second inning. The Pittsburgh Pirates dropped their sixth decision in seven games when Leon Chagnon gave the Chicago Cubs four runs in the eighth and a 5-3 victory. The Phillies and Boston had an open date.

The Philadelphia Athletics climbed back into the first division with an 8-4 triumph over Washington as home runs by Ed Coleman and Mickey Cochrane produced three runs in the seventh.

Herb Pennock gave 11 hits but pitched a shutout and Babe Ruth took the major league home run lead with his 11th as the Yankees strengthened their hold on first place with a double victory over the Boston Red Sox, 4-0 and 8-4.

Chicago's White Sox hammered out another decision over the St. Louis Browns, 5-3, and Cleveland fell into fifth place when the Indians surrendered to "Schoolboy" Rowe and Detroit, 5-2.

BERLIN TO BE SCENE OF 1936 OLYMPIC GAMES

Vienna, June 7 (AP)—The international Olympic committee decided unanimously today to hold the 1936 games in Berlin, settling definitely a controversy that has raged over Jewish discrimination in Germany.

The committee expressed itself as satisfied that the contests will be carried out in Berlin in the Olympic spirit despite the ban placed on Jewish activity in all branches of German life by Chancellor Hitler.

Vienna, June 7 (AP)—Germany is willing to give her word to the international Olympic committee that foreign and German Jews will be permitted to participate, if the 1936 Olympic games are held in Berlin, it was understood today.

German Delegate Lewald, chairman of the organizing committee for the projected Berlin games, was understood to be prepared to deliver the pledge at the committee's opening session today.

The committee announced that it would accept the pledge when it was offered and that the 1936 games then would be definitely scheduled for Berlin.

Recent discriminations against German Jewish athletes have caused widespread reports that the 1936 games would be transferred to some other European city.

Kennedy Scores KO Over Stan Poreda

Newark, N. J., June 7 (AP)—Les Kennedy, Los Angeles heavyweight, scored a surprise technical knockout over Stanley Poreda of Jersey City in the 10th and final round of their bout last night, after flooring him four times.

Referee Gus Waldron halted the bout at 44 seconds of the last session to save Poreda from further punishment. He had taken a severe beating and was almost out on his feet. Kennedy weighed 193½ pounds and Poreda 207.
