PROWLER SHOTS SLEEPING NURSE

Stockton, Calif., June 8 (AP)—An unidentified prowler crept into a bedroom occupied by three young nurses and shot and killed one of them today.

He placed a revolver against the head of Mrs. Bessie Dyson, 23 year old mother of two children. The bullet passed through her head and lodged in the arm of Kathleen O'Neill, asleep beside her. Minnie Hagengruber, third girl in the room, awoke to see the man leap through a window. Police arrested Richard Dyson, estranged husband of Mrs. Dyson. He became hysterical when informed of the shooting and denied he had any connection with it.

Miss O'Neill and Miss Hagengruber, too upset to talk coherently, were unable to advance reasons for the attack.

The three women lived in a cottage which they rented when the Dysons separated.

LEGISLATION AIDS BANKRUPT CITIES

Washington, June 8 (AP)—President Roosevelt has promised to personally for speedy enactment of a bill allowing debt burdened cities to readjust their finances. Mayor James M. Curley of Boston said today after a White House conference.

Legislation now is before congress which would enable cities to come under provisions of the revised federal bankruptcy act.

REPEAL FORCES FILE TICKETS IN 25 COUNTIES

Wet forces seeking ratification by Oregon of the proposal to repeal the 18th amendment to the federal constitution have completed their tickets of candidates to the state constitutional convention in 25 of the 37 counties, and to date have candidates in the field for 105 of the 116 seats in the convention.

Dry forces opposing repeal have completed tickets in only 11 counties.

Repeatist candidates filling to date total 113, including 42 aspirants for the 34 seats allotted to Multnomah county, while the total of dry candidates runs only to 55.

Under the terms of the legislative act calling for the election of delegates to the convention at a special election July 21 all candidates must file their declarations, together with a statement as to whether they favor or oppose repeal, with the secretary of state by Saturday night of this week.

There have been no filings from Crook and Curry counties. The others have partial tickets for one or both sides of the question.

The counties with complete tickets for each, with the number of seats to which they are entitled are Clackamas 5, Douglas 3, Hood River 1, Jackson 4, Lincoln 1, Marion 7, Morrow 1, Sherman 1 and Wasco 2.

Those with completed wet tickets are Clatsop 3, Coos 3, Deschutes 2, Gilliam 1, Grant 1, Harney 1, Jefferson 1, Lake 1, Lane 6, Multnomah 42 for 34 seats, Polk 2, Tillamook 2, Umatilla 3, Union 2, Washington 4, Wheeler 1, and Yamhill 3.

Counties with incomplete tickets on either side are Columbia, Josephine, Klamath, Linn and Malheur.

The 21 candidates which filed today include 19 drys and two wets. Six candidates filed from Multnomah county. They are Fred W. Wagner, Joseph E. Harvey, W. M. Hecock, C. W. Miller, M. Theresa Norton and George B. Pratt. All but Wagner favor retention. Five dry candidates filed from Clackamas county as follows: William A. Aldrich, H. E. Browne, Della Green, Thomas G. Lewis and Edward Shearer.

Other candidates include D. H. Magill, Wallawa; Stanley H. Jewell, Klamath; Truman A. Chase and Jacob H. Miller, Lane; Neal Maw, Lincoln; Joel R. Benton, Morrow; W. A. Briggs and Frank M. Gill, Wasco, all drys. Oscar Hayter, Polk county filed as a wet.

37 GOLD HOARDERS DEFY GOVERNMENT

Washington, June 8 (AP)—Attorney General Cummings said today that 37 gold hoarders, possessing \$288,064, had flatly refused to surrender their holdings but that since the campaign against the hoarders started Saturday some \$6,000,000 had been returned to the treasury by 408 persons.

ROSSON SAYS NEWS TO HIM

Spokane, June 8 (AP)—Declaring that he is "absolutely uninformed on the situation," Hugh Rossion, graduate manager of the University of Oregon, told the Associated Press today that any discussion as to whether the University will issue an invitation for the 1934 state high school basketball tournament in Oregon must await his return to Eugene.

Advised that the state board of higher education had suggested invitations for the tournament be extended by the university and state college rather than Willamette university, Rossion said "all this is absolutely news to me."

"We certainly will be pleased to cooperate with the high school association in doing anything we can to better high school basketball," the graduate manager said. "We would be more than glad to entertain the state tournament at Eugene whenever possible."

He declared again, however, that "I am absolutely uninformed on the situation," and "I can't say until I get back." Rossion was here for the Pacific northwest coaching conference.

CHEERRIANS TO LEAVE BY TRAIN FOR ROSE SHOW

Rain Thursday failed to dampen the ardor of the sponsors of the Cheerrian-American Legion special to the Portland Rose festival Friday and sufficient tickets had been sold to insure an almost capacity crowd. In event townpeople, who are invited to make the trip on the special, evince cooperation additional equipment will be added.

The special will leave from Trade and Commercial at 9:30 o'clock leaving Portland around 11 o'clock and returning to its point of origin. Because of the rain, the appearance of the national championship drum corps with the Thursday night parent has been cancelled as the field at the stadium in Portland is too muddy for maneuvering. Other numbers of the program will be staged as scheduled according to word from Portland.

All members of the American Legion who are making the trip to Portland with the special train Friday, other than the drum corps and band, are requested to wear the official American Legion cap. 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GIN MARRIAGE LAW IN EFFECT

At 5 o'clock this afternoon will be the last chance to buy a cash and carry marriage license. Tomorrow the new "gin" marriage law is in effect which requires a three day wait after the application for a license is filed which in effect, according to interpretation of the law, causes five days to intervene before issuance of a license after application is made.

RECOVERY BILL CALLED INSANE

Washington, June 8 (AP)—The industrial recovery bill and the relief over veterans' economies stood today in the way of the administration's attempt for adjournment Saturday. Majority Leader Byrns predicted adjournment next week.

Early conference agreement was expected on the railroad aid bill. The fate of the Glass-Steagall reform measure this session remained in doubt, conferees having failed at an agreement as yet after two conferences with President Roosevelt.

New York, June 8 (AP)—Max Baer, California heavyweight tipped the scales at only 203 pounds, seven under what he had said he would, when he weighed in at New York State Athletic commission headquarters today for his 15-round bout with Max Schmeling in Yankee stadium tonight.

Schmeling stepped on the scales to send the bar to 189½ pounds, within ½ of a pound of the weight he said he would carry into the ring. He thus will give Baer an advantage of 13½ pounds.
