OREGON NORMAL YEAR FINISHED AND TESTS HELD

Monmouth—The year's work for the Oregon Normal school was concluded Friday with final tests in all the departments. Commencement exercises were held Thursday in the chapel with a capacity audience of relatives and friends present to witness the 200 seniors receive diplomas. A large number of alumni members returned for the day which also marked the 50th anniversary of the school's commencement. Joe Gunn, a Portland principal, replaces N. A. The school's summer session will open June 19 to continue for 12 weeks. A two weeks course of special appeal to teachers now in the field is offered at the beginning.
