

RIVER ALARMS HOP GROWERS: RISE SURPRISE

Independence—The high water in the river is causing some concern to hop growers and farmers on the bottom lands. The ferry has been tied up on account of it and the drift that is running may cause considerable damage to hop yards in this vicinity. Farmers northeast of town were cut off from reaching their farms by automobiles as the water in several feet over the county roads leading to the McLaughlin ranch, Davidson and Hedges, Hower Woods, Swope and Berry, Cooks, Soper and Patton and Walkers. Most much is also isolated by back waters in the sloughs.

The freshest at this time of year was unloaded for and little preparation was made to meet emergency. Hops are standing in water a few places completely submerged. Not since 1906 has Independence seen as high water at this season of year. In 1906 there was a flood stage in the latter part of May and considerable spring grain in the bottoms was washed out but no material damage was done to hops that year although a few yards were completely covered.

About 50 head of young cattle on the Seidback estate across the river are being rounded up by the owners, who placed them there for pasture.

The river raised about five feet here during the past 12 hours and this morning has slackened to some extent but still raising a little. The weather has cleared and if no further local showers come the river will probably remain at present level until the snow water comes out of the mountains.
