

PACIFIC COAST SQUADS RENEW TITLE BATTLE

Hollywood's Stars take the field at Oakland today with high hopes of bettering their first place position at the expense of the slipping Oaks while their four closest rivals are fighting among themselves.

Sacramento, trailing Hollywood by a bare two points, faces the Missions on the Solon's home diamond. In view of their five triumphs over Portland last week, the Missions are scheduled to cause plenty of trouble at the California capital.

Somewhat chastened by their five Mission linkings, the Portland Beavers engage Los Angeles at Wrigley field this week. Manager Spencer Abbott thinks his veterans are going to cop the 1933 pennant and expects them to resume their winning drive with the Angels as the victims. Four defeats at Sacramento last week sent the Angels down to fifth place.

In the fourth league engagement San Francisco crosses bats with Seattle again in their fight for seventh place. At Seattle two weeks ago each team won four games of the eight played. Since then the Seals have been strengthened by the addition of outfielder Elmer Fink, obtained from the Chicago White Sox.

Oscar Eckhardt, slugging Mission outfielder continued to hold a commanding lead in the Pacific Coast league batting averages today, with a .443 total to his credit, 46 points of his closest competitor.

And just to make the Mission club's place in the records doubly sure, Louis Almada, another outfielder slipped into second place, hitting .397. This shoved Larry Woodall, Sacramento, into third position with .390.

Largely on the basis of the heavy stick work of Eckhardt and Almada, the Mission nine led the team averages with .324 in 70 games.

OLD TIME CLOWN AND MARY

Not all babies have real lion cubs, cute little Shetland ponies and a score of varieties of dogs to pick from for playmates. But Mary Fisher, daughter of one of the officials with the A. G. Barnes Circus has all those and in fact an endless array of the weird and bizarre that nature has bestowed to entertain and amuse her. Mary is three years old and first saw the light of day in a New Hampshire city where the big show was playing.

The boys and girls of the A. G. Barnes circus coming to Salem Sat., June 24, for performances at 2 and 8 p.m., number nearly a score. Some of them represent the third and fourth generation of famous circus families. They comprise, in addition to Mary, two tiny concert dancers, a smart young bicycle rider, several acrobats and gymnasts, two Japanese boys and others who travel with their parents. They are a modest, healthy, honest party of playmates.

Charley Post, the "most lettered man" with the show, who holds several degrees from an Eastern university, is assigned the task to conduct school for these youngsters every morning. In the ring Post is a famous clown whose drolleries have convulsed circus audiences of America and Continental Europe for two decades. But outside of the ring he is a very serious minded young man. The training of these children begins almost at birth. Indeed, in the vast majority of cases, there is the powerful effect of heredity, which exercises an influence upon the child and helps it to overcome obstacles to others well-nigh impossible. The chief effort is to create courage and daring, to develop those qualities where they already exist. The lungs are broadened and expanded by hearty exercise, and the muscles are hardened and developed by athletic work.

New York, June 13 (AP)—The floundering Brooklyn Dodgers were down in seventh place in the National league standing again today after dropping a 7 to 4 decision to the tail-end Phillies, enabling the idle Boston Braves to take over sixth position.

Owen Carroll, who hasn't finished a game for the Dodgers since May 18, was the victim of a Philadelphia attack that netted six runs before the fourth frame was completed.

With Manager Donie Bush back on Cincinnati's bench after a month's illness, the Reds downed Chicago, 6 to 5. George Grantham's triple with the bases loaded and two out featured the Red's deciding four-run rally in the seventh. Bob Smith held the Cubs to eight hits, while Malone and Bush yielded 13.

They were the only National league games played.

Only one game was scheduled in the American circuit. Chicago dropped to fourth place when beaten, 3 to 1, by St. Louis, boosting the idle Philadelphia Athletics into third position. Bruce Campbell won the game with a homer in the eighth, driving in a runner ahead of him.

Thanks to Silverton which turned back Woodburn 4 to 2 Sunday afternoon, Salem yet has a chance to finish out in front.

Offensively there is little to choose between the three leaders. Woodburn, having tallied 22 times in three games, Silverton 21 and Salem 20. Stayton is trailing with 12. On defense Woodburn apparently has the better of the argument since the club has held its opponents to five runs. In this department Salem is second with 16 runs scored against it. Silverton third with 19 and Stayton last with 35.

Wednesday's contests which features Salem at Silverton and Stayton at Woodburn may result in a pitchers duel at Silverton between Gatchel and Schwab. Gatchel had the better of the argument on Olinger field last Wednesday when the local won 7 to 2. It would appear, however, that Schwab had an off day when he appeared against Salem, pudding by his win over Woodburn Sunday when he fanned 15 batters. Woodburn had previously thumped Salem 13 to 0.

Salem may be handicapped against Silverton due to Aker's sore arm resulting from a collision at the home plate in Sunday's game. The showing of Mike Miller at third base has been gratifying to Coach Hawk and the fans. His throws to first have been accurate and with a little more experience Mike is expected to put considerable more speed into his efforts.

Woodburn should have little difficulty with Stayton although Champ and Foster both displayed ability as moundsmen and a little better control might cause an upset.

Mehama—Mr. and Mrs. Lu Dickson who have had charge of the Mehama hotel for the last few years, have moved onto the Kriel place above Mehama.

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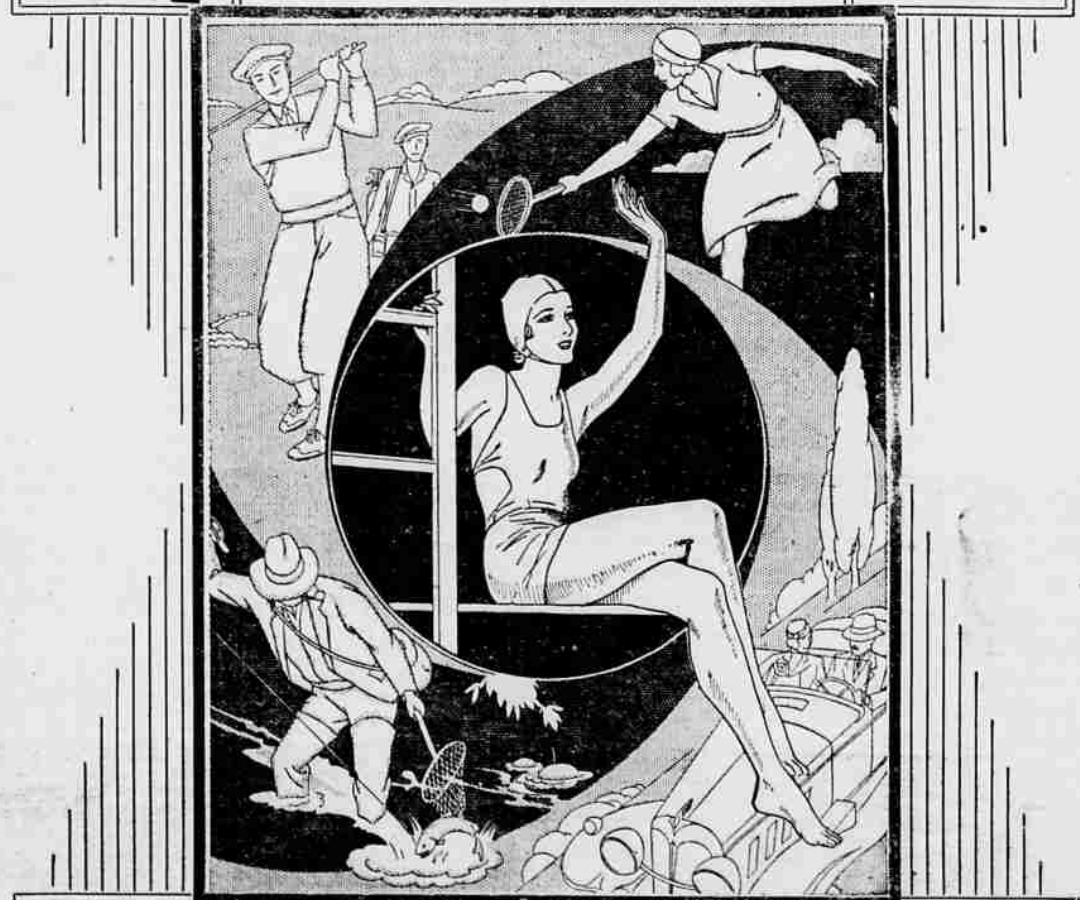
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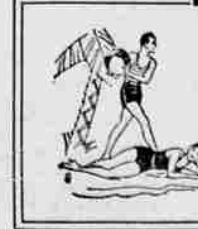


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
