SCHOOL COSTS ARE REDUCED

Stayton—Figures released by Paul Stayton, clerk of the Stayton school district, show a cost per high school pupil of \$54.88. The official school directory for 1927-28, the year before transportation was introduced showed a cost for tuition alone of \$97.35 per pupil. This represents a saving of \$32.47 for taxpayers of the non-high school districts for each pupil or nearly enough to pay the county allowance of \$35 per pupil for transportation. The cost of tuition and transportation this year will be practically the same as the cost formerly was for tuition alone. The special levy of the district has been reduced \$2 mills over the previous year. Mr. Stayton's annual report will show a reduction of warranted indebtedness to a very small figure due to economical operation during the past year. Further drastic savings are planned in the budget to be voted on June 19.
