

BEAVERS YIELD ANOTHER GAME TO ANGELS, 12-2

Manager Oscar Vitt of Hollywood thinks Los Angeles is the team to beat in the 1933 Coast league pennant race. So do Skipper Spencer Abbott and all his Portland Beavers today after receiving their third straight setback from the Angels.

The cause of the Portland slump that has cost the champions eight of their last ten games was no mystery yesterday. It was just a case of too much Dick Ward. The youthful Angel tosser set the Beavers down with 7 hits and 2 runs as his mates pounded out a 12-2 triumph. Rudy Kallio, leading Coast league pitcher, was the first victim of the 19-hit Angel assault that included home runs by Gene Lillard, Ward and Bill Cronin. He gave six hits and four runs before giving way to "Junk" Walters in the second inning. The defeat was Kallio's first of the season.

Sacramento maintained its one game lead over Hollywood by nailing out the Missions last night, 8-2. Johnny Babich threw wild to third in the eighth inning to let in the winning Senator run and break his winning streak of seven in a row. Archie Campbell proved the victory tonic Hollywood needed and pitched the Stars to their first victory of the current series at Oakland, 3-2. He had a little better of Lou McEvoy in a pitching duel, broken up in the eighth when Ray Jacobs lifted a four-batter over the left field fence with Doug Taitt on base. It was the Hollywood first sacker's 24th homer of the season. Picking up six unearned runs on five San Francisco errors, Seattle beat the Seals 8-5 to gain a 2-1 edge in the series.

This is nothing new for the rejuvenated Red Sox of 1923—at one time during the second week of the campaign they were as high as seventh place—nor was their rise entirely unexpected. But the way in which they accomplished the feat of leaving the cellar made it appear that they have no intention of returning.

The humble tail-enders picked on the New York Yankees, world's champions and league leaders, as the instrument of their rise and won four straight games. An 8 to 5 triumph yesterday finally lifted them above the idle St. Louis

CHICAGO MEET ATTRACTS BEST U. S. ATHLETES

Chicago, June 16 (AP)—With virtually every outstanding athlete in the country entered, the World's Fair national collegiate track and field meet opened today at Soldier field.

At the same time high school athletes from 25 states participated in the preliminaries of the 37th annual national interscholastic track and field meet.

Trials in 13 of the 15 N.C.A.A. events were scheduled today, with the finals Saturday night. The finals in the high school meet will be held tomorrow afternoon.

Southern California, Stanford, Indiana, Michigan and Louisiana State rate as the favorites in the national collegiate meet. Southern California won the I.C.A.A.A. title and has the best balanced team in the N.C.A.A. meet. Stanford, however, with a preponderance of strength in the field events may nose out the Trojans.

Stanford's four "trained elephants"—Henri Laborde, Slinger Dunn, John Lyman and Nello Gray—all alone figure to score almost 40 points in the shotput and discus. Unless other contenders crowd them out, Stanford may pick up enough points in the pole vault, hurdles and javelin to carry off the team championship.

Points are scored as follows in the N.C.A.A. meet: first, 10; second, 8; third, 6; fourth, 4; fifth, 2, and sixth, 1.
