

WOODBURN UNIT SELECTS YODER TRUCKER CHIEF

Woodburn—Regardless of what you have been told, this new truck control act will put about 16,000 of small Oregon truck operators out of business July 1. J. W. Smith of Salem told Woodburn truckers at a meeting here last night at the city hall.

About 80 were present at the session, which ended with a pledged membership of 75. Delegations from McMinnville, Newberg and Yamhill were present with reports of pledged memberships totaling nearly 500 for these districts. Woodburn members of the Truck Owners and Farmers' Protective association will aid meetings to be held at Newberg June 24 and at McMinnville June 26.

Samuel S. Yoder, local dealer in feed, asserted that study of the bill revealed vicious regulations that would cause unemployment, property loss and a certain increase in fuel and freight transportation costs.

W. L. Carver, secretary of the state association, told of plans to halt the bill through injunction and by remedial action at a special session of the legislature now being urged.

Samuel S. Yoder was named president and Fred J. Miller was chosen secretary of the Woodburn unit, which, it is planned, will be made permanent for the purpose of preventing legislation not in the public interest.

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Recall Candidates Take Platform At Silverton; Mass Meeting Is Lively

Silverton—The definite statement of the platform of the recall candidates was the only tangible feature of the three and a half hours' program of the mass meeting held at the Silverton armory Friday evening.

If the work of the recall committee is successful the new board of directors for the Silverton schools will consist of Attorney C. E. Ross, retained member of the board; I. D. Worden, H. B. Jorgensen, E. J. Boesch, A. J. Lathers. The directors listed for recall are Dr. R. E. Kleinsorge and R. B. Duncan. Directors retiring who are nominated for their own re-election are Merlin F. Conrad, and H. R. Ish.

The statement of these men who wish to replace the present members is as follows:

CANDIDATES SPEAK

Jorgensen: "Friends, I have very little to say, but if I am elected to this board I shall stand for strict economy with due regard to education."

Lathers: He stated that as a school director he would pursue the same careful business methods that he does in his own business. (He operates a farm.) He said: "I was nominated as school director on the platform that has been read to you this evening—that is that we hire a new superintendent and combine an office with the office of the senior high school principal at a salary not to exceed \$2000 a year."

Boesch: "I am for the best of education and I know we can have it for less money. If I am elected there will be no 'closed doors' anyone is welcome to any meeting."

Worden: I. D. Worden was born in Wisconsin and did not attend school beyond the grades. As an orphan boy he made his way since 13 years of age. Started as water boy with the Northern Pacific railway company at 14 years. At 16 became brakeman. Thereafter freight and passenger conductor, yard master and general yard master. In all, he was in the actual service of the company 42 years. He refused the position of assistant superintendent. Mr. and Mrs. Worden have no children but they have paid for schooling for seven young people. He said: "Provided I am elected as director I will see that the taxpayers will not be misused and this school will not be closed."

A. B. Anderson, chairman of the recall committee made the introductory speech to a large group which crowded every available space of the armory after they had waited 45 minutes for operations to begin. Among those present judging from the applause on different occasions, the crowd was about equally divided favoring recall and against it. Anderson introduced Alf O. Nelson as chairman in his stead. Nelson, after numerous preliminary remarks, introduced the imported lawyer, Lars Bergvik of Salem, attorney for the recall committee whose membership included Bill Nicol, A. B. Anderson, George Kirk, Charlie Dahlen and Gilbert Moser.

L. C. Eastman, member of the citizens committee asked that unnecessary demonstration be dispensed with and requested the people to ask Bergvik, "who he represents," when he makes his various statements this evening.

BERGVIK PERSONAL

With Hal Campbell as leader, members of the previous high school band were present and contributed several numbers. The group began to wonder if the show that they had come to enjoy had been dispensed with, because the delay indicated a disorganization yet when Bergvik started his three hour talk, things began to shape themselves. Among his first statements were that in the profession of law two sides must be taken and that if both sides are right someone is a liar. "I came here for the benefit of the people and to represent the recall committee."

In general Bergvik's remarks dealt with personalities. He mentioned Mrs. Cameron as misapprehending the use of the auditorium in the Eugene Field building and thereby keeping the mass meeting from the school building. The board of school directors claimed to have granted the request of Mr. Worden for the use of the school building, Wednesday, June 14.

Bergvik repeated a number of times that when he approached the state department of education and County Superintendent Pulkerson they threw up their hands.

NAUGHTY WORD USED

Bergvik broke a promise when Miss Wharton, a local teacher of the guidance group was refused the privilege of seeing a letter supposed to be written by a 12 year old girl of the guidance class. He had used this letter as a demonstration in condemning the teaching of guidance as "rot."

Among those who resented the personalities that were anything but complimentary flung abroad by the speaker, Merlin F. Conrad, a member of the present school board interrupted with the words, "That is unfair and untrue, and a lie." The lawyer had accused Conrad of refusing to accept word for the school at a certain price.

Robert Goetz, city superintendent of schools, defended himself against the onslaught of Bergvik and openly told him his statements were false. These were in regard to accusations concerning the county and state school superintendents, and their statements that Bergvik was alleged to have misquoted.

L. C. Eastman was another who rose to the bait of Bergvik in a personal accusation and backed him down in a statement in regards to the percent of signers of the recall petition. Eastman's words were: "I said at the meeting last Monday night that 15 percent of the parents residing in the school district signed the recall petitions." Bergvik then asked Eastman, "What was it you said about the 60 percent?" Eastman said: "I stated that 60 percent of the signers were not taxpayers." Eastman further stated that he did not object to being quoted but he wanted to be quoted correctly.

At one time Bergvik entered into the sentimental in defense of Miss Hannah Olson who was replaced as principal of the grade school for the coming year, her work being taken over by the city superintendent in the name of economy. He mentioned that at times Miss Olson had taken little children with wet feet into the school room, took off their shoes and stockings and dried their feet, and also kindness was repaid by the school board with a reduction of 28 percent in salary. Mrs. Edson Constock was another who came in for her share of criticism by the Salem speaker.

SCHOOL HEAD CRITICISED

Bergvik got one good laugh, mostly from the farthest recesses of the balcony with much "hoo hoo's" and stamping of feet when he suggested that the members of the board of directors and Goetz were held up as nothing short of angels. He personally criticized Mrs. Pulkerson's manner of presenting the figures from her office to the opposition of the recall committee's work at Monday night's meeting.

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OREGON NORMAL OFFERS NINETY SHORT COURSES

Monmouth—Following a week's vacation the Oregon Normal school will open Monday, June 19, for the two terms of the summer session.

Enrollment made in either or both terms. The first six weeks session will be held from June 19 to July 28 and the second five weeks from July 31 to September 1. During the full period of 11 weeks a term's work may be completed and recent high school graduates as well as more advanced students may utilize the summer offerings as a regular quarter.

A total of 99 courses are being offered in the fields of art, economics, education, history, mathematics, music, physical education, psychology, laboratory, science and sociology.

President J. A. Churchill will be director of the Monmouth session and most of the regular members of the faculty will remain to teach during the summer.

The training schools at Monmouth and Independence, which are the only two to operate this summer, will also begin Monday for a six weeks' term. Classes which will begin at 9 o'clock will be held in the forenoon only.

Courses in addition to the regular curriculum will include tennis, swimming and archery. Midget, the training school paper, will continue its publication during the summer school. The Elkins and Lewisville school bus route is to be extended through Airlie and the Valley View community to accommodate the large attendance anticipated for the Monmouth school.
