

SILVERTON REJECTS SCHOOL RECALL MOVEMENT

OLD DIRECTORS ESTABLISH LEAD AT HEAVY VOTE

Silverton—The largest school vote in the history of Silverton was cast at Monday's election, when 1088 stated their preference in regard to the recall of Dr. E. E. Kleinsorge and B. B. Duncan from the board of directors. The final count showed Kleinsorge had a majority of 186 over all votes cast, and Duncan a like majority of 172 votes. Merlin Conrad and H. B. Irish who were elected to succeed themselves also scored a majority of all votes cast. At the time Merlin Conrad was first chosen to serve on the board, only 23 votes were cast.

This overwhelming showing of preference will probably settle the school question for a time. However, murmurs were plentiful on the streets during the afternoon when the ballots were being cast, when it was discovered that the opposition's nominative petitions revealed that the nominees had filed for an indefinite term which was interpreted as three years, and many threats of arrests, recants, revoting, and other expressions of discontent emanated from the recall committee group who had placed men in the field to replace the two men slated for recall.

Two places in town were designated to care for all who wished to vote, one board serving at the senior high school and the other at the city hall. Six hundred fifty four votes were cast at the school and 432 at the city hall. Results were:

Shall R. B. Duncan be recalled? Yes 426, No 611.

Shall Dr. E. E. Kleinsorge be recalled? Yes 434, No 593.

There were four defective votes in the recall. The vote for directors:

Conrad 562; Irish 580; Worden 136; Lathers 147; Jorgenson 223; Boesch 105.

Seventy-five director votes were defective.
