

BOARD CHANGE
MADE AT SCIO;
CENSUS GIVEN

Scio—J. D. Densmore, Jr., was elected director for three years at the annual school meeting for district 95 Monday. Thirty-six ballots were cast of which Densmore received 20 and Gilbert Calavan 16. O. A. Hall was nominated by Mrs. Cora Calavan but declined. These were the only candidates.

In the election for clerk J. P. Wesely, incumbent, was placed in nomination by Mylo Bartu and Gilbert Calavan by P. G. Cary. No other nominations were made, and the first ballot results in the election of Wesely, who received 26 out of 35 votes cast.

Detailed tabulations of figures concerning the financial operations of the Scio grade and high schools had been placed on the blackboard by Mr. Wesely, clerk, and were explained at length by him. It appeared that the expenses of operating the school last year amounted to \$15,652.38. A balance of \$111.07 was shown at the close of the school year, June 19, 1933.

According to school district census figures presented by Wesely, there were last November, 126 of legal school age in the district, 62 being boys and 64 girls. The estimated expenses of the school for next year were placed at \$15,170.48.

The meeting this year was one of the largest for several years. Although the matter of high school transportation was not formally at issue, it is understood the school board as now constituted continues to be favorable to that custom. The personnel of the board includes L. J. Jones, chairman; P. W. Schunk and J. D. Densmore, Densmore had been serving by appointment for several weeks, succeeding Early Phillips who resigned. Jones presided at Monday's meeting.

FIFTH ANNUAL
DICKEY TRIBE
REUNION HELD

Sheridan—The fifth annual reunion of the Dickey clan was held Sunday in an all-day session at the Buell grange hall. The Dickey family for years has been prominent in and around Sheridan and the reunion Sunday was outstanding in comparison with former gatherings of the clan, 88 being present as compared with 67 last year and 49 in 1931.

Dinner was served at noon in the grange dining hall, two long tables the length of the hall being required for seating. Mrs. Ernest Dickey of Grand Ronde pronounced the blessing and the tables fairly groaned with food.

The afternoon was given over to the business session and to music and dancing by the young people. Frank Dickey of Sheridan, president of the organization for two years, presided over the business meeting at which the following were elected: President, Holt Stockton of Sheridan; Walter Dickey of Amity, vice president; Mrs. May Scroggins Hutcheson of Salem, secretary-treasurer; Mill Dickey, Mrs. Dolly James of Mill City and Mrs. James Nairn of Salem, trustees.

The oldest member present was Mrs. Mary E. Nairn of Salem, the daughter of the first Dickey to land in Oregon. She is 79 years old. The youngest member was the six-month old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ho Harris of Sheridan.

Besides Mrs. Nairn there survives the first Dickey of Oregon, four sons, Frank and N. M. Dickey of Canada, J. A. of Astoria and Walter of Amity; Frank and Walter being present Sunday. All were born on the old donation land claim located three miles south of Willamina.

David Van Horn of Portland, who had always met with the clan at their gatherings, was greatly missed, he having passed away in April at the age of 69.

The third Sunday in June, 1934, in Sheridan city park will be the date and place of the next reunion. A family history prepared by May Scroggins Hutchinson revealed the following facts of interest not only to those interested in the history of the clan but also of the early history of this section of the state:

The first Dickey to set foot in Oregon was J. N. Dickey who came as captain of a wagon train from Lone Jack, Mo., Sept. 25, 1852. He returned to Missouri Oct. 1 of the same year on the "Brother Jonathan," a Portland sailing boat, and walked across the isthmus.

In April, 1852 he returned in charge of another train, arriving in September and settled on his donation land claim located about three miles south of Willamina. He brought his wife and his brother and sisters, T. J. Dickey, John, David, Francis, Eliza, Mary Jane, Mahalia and Susan all of whom for the most part settled near their brother.

Frank Dickey of Sheridan has the double barrel muzzle-loading shot gun which boasts the death of two Indians and which was brought by his father in 1852 on his second trip west. His father died on the old donation land claim in 1888.

INFORMATION GIVEN
ABOUT LOST PIGEON

Scio—Concerning the messenger pigeon recently found at the A. Hetzendorf farm near Scio, the United States biological survey at Washington, D. C., says in response to an inquiry from here:

"Pigeons are generally thus banded by fanciers who raise them for market and racing purposes. We have learned, however, that these persons show little interest in the fate of the bird that fails to return to its proper loft, as they consider such failures indicative of lack of strength or homing instinct. Tens of thousands of racing pigeons are banded and flown every year in this country, so that it is not surprising that many should be lost.

"The bands issued by the biological survey are for use only on wild native species. They carry, in addition to a serial number, the legend 'Notify Biological Survey, Washington, D. C.' or on the smaller sizes an abbreviation of this request."

Similar information was given by the federal department relative to a pigeon which jolted at the Fred Sommer farm near here two years ago.
