5 YEAR OFFER MADE ON HOPS

Offer of a contract for 1000 bales of hops a year for five years on a basis of 50 cents for the first year, 40 cents for the second, 30 cents for the third and 25 cents each year for the last two years, has been made to A. M. Jerman, well known local hop grower, who has advised he will accept. The offer came through Bill Bishop, representative of Hughes & Company who is in the east and wired Jerman asking if he would take on such a contract. Jerman answered in the affirmative at once but the actual deal has not been signed up as yet.

It is reported that Cliff Noakes for Ray has taken on another 500 bales contract with three growers on a basis of 50 cents for the first year and 40 for the second, these being but two year contracts.

A spot sale has been reported, the first for some little time, T. A. Livesley & Company buying a carload from two Eugene growers at 66 cents.

Other contracts and contract offers are reported with the market showing the most active interest of two weeks or more.

MINING BOARD IS NAMED BY GOVERNOR

Appointments to the mining board created by the 1933 legislature were made yesterday by Governor Julius L. Meier.

They include Frank McColloch of Baker, Martin Ferrey of Rouge River and R. M. Betts of Black Butte, all to serve three years without compensation. A paid secretary will be maintained at the state capital. Frank Jennings of Eugene, Mrs. Meredith Bailey of Sisters and Earl C. Bronaugh, Sr., of Portland, were appointed by the governor to the state library board, created by the last legislature.

Dr. J. H. Rossman of Portland was appointed to the state board of health, representing the dental profession, and Charles Reynolds of Silverton was named to succeed J. G. Rankin of Portland on the state board of aeronautics.

Portland, June 22 (AP)—The First National Bank of Portland today took over the deposit liability of about \$4,300,000 and the safe deposit business of the American National bank, and will operate the institution as a branch bank.

E. B. MacNaughton, president of the First National, said "a large part of the working staff of the American National bank will be retained by the First National." The American National in an uptown location, will be remodeled to meet requirements of a branch unit.

Aaron M. Frank, chairman of the board of the American National, and manager of the Meier & Frank company here, said he found he could not efficiently serve the bank and store and decided the store should have his entire consideration.

CONDEMN BOOS BY PRISONERS

Condemnation of the action of two or three prisoners of the county jail in booing members of the Grand Army of the Republic and the American flag during the annual parade of the veterans Wednesday forenoon is voiced in a resolution adopted by Joshua Smith camp No. 6, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War and made public today. The identity of the men making the disturbance was not learned.

"During the G. A. R. parade Wednesday morning while passing the courthouse on Court street, they were greeted with a series of boos coming from the jail," the resolution reads. "Because of the fact that the parade was made up of the defenders of the nation, the G. A. R. and the allied orders and headed by the national colors, this affront was considered a gross insult to these aged veterans and all patriotic organizations. The seriousness of this is evident to all and should not be passed over lightly."

"Therefore, be it resolved by the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil

War in state encampment assembled, that we go on record as condemning such serious affront to the flag of our country. Respect and loyalty to the flag must be maintained if we are to enjoy peace and happiness."

REGISTRATION IN COUNTY HEAVIEST

Interest in the July election on measures and repeal of the 18th amendment apparently is more life in the country districts than in city precincts as indicated by the mail of County Clerk Boyer this morning from various registrars over the county who are sending in their returns on registration which closed Tuesday evening. The cards so far in from country districts far exceed in number those signed up at the county clerk's office during the registration period and many more are to be heard from yet.

It will probably be a number of days before final returns can be had on registration as these all have to be checked out and part of the clerk's force is busy on that job.

ITINERARY FOR PORTLAND TRIP SET BY HIKERS

An itinerary which will include visits to a number of points of interest within the city limits of Portland has been worked out for the Chemeketa expedition which will start with an overnight bivouac in the cinder cone of Mt. Tabor park, according to a communication received today by E. M. Hoffnall from Eugene H. Dowling, Portland attorney who is in charge of arrangements. Dowling and Mr. Keyser, superintendent of Portland parks, Wednesday drove over the route which they expect to lead the Chemeketas Sunday. The distance travelled was approximately 40 miles, including visits to some of the high schools, the new municipal incinerator, St. John's bridge, the Hillsdale drive, Sky Line boulevard, through the arboretum and Washington park.
