

BIG SNOWSLIDE BEING MELTED; SNOW REMAINS

Solo — A huge snowslide that crashed down the south slope of Henelmin mountain in April in the Elkhorn mining district in the region of the Little North Fork of the Santiam river is slowly disappearing as a result of recent rains and the withering rays of the sun, according to R. E. Peery, manager of the Crown mine in that locality, who was in from the property this week.

"The avalanche came with such force and created such a terrific roar that all employees were disturbed at an early morning hour," Peery said in relating the circumstances. Much of the snow and debris still remains and doubtless will be there on the Fourth of July, a situation not known for 25 years, Peery said.

Freshets of winter proportions have resulted in that region, Peery reported. "Trucks loaded with supplies for the army camp at Black Eagle were stalled in mud and sand at the old Elkhorn ranch, but the roadbed is being cleared and improved and a grade constructed to eliminate the difficult hill above Elkhorn."

It was reported that the big mill at the Amalgamated mine was running almost to capacity and that late developments had opened up even a better grade of ore. "Shipments of this ore, which runs high in gold, lead and zinc, are to start soon."

The drift at the Crown mine has reached the area for which it has been driven, and important developments are expected in the near future, Peery said. "The flood of the past week carried away most of the dump in the canyon bed and also took out some track, and considerable snow is yet visible on the high places and the north sides of the ridges."
