

## SUMMER TERM WORK STARTED; CLASSES VARY

Independence—The summer session of the Independence training school last Monday morning with the registration of 176 pupils, the largest registration ever for a summer session. The seventh and eighth grades under Miss Wolfer lead all other groups with an enrollment of 58. Miss Oma Bell Emmons, principal, stated that she was highly satisfied with the way things were working out, and with the passing of the present epidemic of measles, the attendance will increase further. The absence of pupils from the districts is noticeable and is due to the discontinuance of the buses for the summer term.

Classes in the prescribed curriculum are well under way, and a great deal of enthusiasm is being manifested in extra-curricular activities; archery and tennis are attracting many boys and girls and a swimming program which will be set up later in the summer when the river falls back to normalcy, promises to be a popular branch of outdoor school activity. Plans for this work are under way and instruction and supervision will be provided at regular hours which will be announced later.

For the first time in summer school here, special instructions in music, art and physical education are on duty every day. The buses from Monmouth carry the practice teachers and special instructors, arriving at 9 and 10:45 o'clock each morning. Several of the graduates of this year are attending the session to strengthen themselves in certain courses, preparatory to high school entrance in the fall.
