

POWELL FAMILY SEEKS CHURCH FOR GATHERING

Silverton—The Bethany church building and grounds were favorably discussed at the meeting of the Powell clan held in Albany Sunday, as an appropriate acquisition for a meeting place of their annual reunion in the future.

The descendants of John, Alfred and Noah Powell pioneer Christian church ministers and circuit riders of western Oregon are desirous of obtaining the Bethany grounds because of the association of the early years in the Bethany church of the work of these ministers who were instrumental in the founding of the organization.

No church services have been held in the Bethany building for several years and Frank Hubbs has acted as trustee of the grounds, which he has kept in shape.

Perry Powell of Monmouth is president of the clan and F. M. Powell of Silverton is secretary. The oldest member present Sunday was John Propst, 96, of Albany, who made a lengthy speech, telling of early pioneer occurrences. Only one other direct descendant of his generation is living, Vina Cornelius, of Albany, a sister of Mrs. Ann Schaeffer, mother of the Salem Schaeffers, descendants of the Noah Powell branch of the family.

An unusual occurrence is the fact that John Propst has lived on his present farm since 1868, the 115 acres bought for him by his grandfather, Rev. John Powell, brother of his mother, Lucinda Powell Propst. With him live his son, Q. E. Propst; his grandson, Q. E. Propst, Jr.; his great grandson, Eldon Propst, 12, besides other members of the Q. E. Propst, Jr., family.
