DRY TALK GIVEN AT WEST SALEM AHEAD OF DRIVE

Dallas—Vernon L. McPherson, one of Polk county's dry candidates, was the leading speaker at a rally which was held Sunday in West Salem. Highlights in McPherson's talk were the classification of the opponents of the 18th amendment into four district groups and the denunciation of the scheme which is behind the move for repeal.

McPherson took as his theme, "Can you see through the blind?" In his four group classification he named:

1. Those moved by their slavery to their appetite to drink.
2. Those moved by greed of gain at the expense of others.
3. Those moved by the false arguments of the first two groups that repeal would have beneficial results, and.
4. Those moved by a spirit of adventure, indifference or curiosity in a desire to see what the "good old days" were like.

The speaker characterized the repeal movement as a scheme to substitute a liquor tax which would eliminate an income tax upon the wealthy, as a scheme which would cheat the drinkers' families of personal liberty, food, health and happiness, a scheme which would bring back the saloon, or something worse, with its attendant poverty, misery, shame and crime."

Supporting the speaker were Mrs. R. L. Turrell and Prof. Lyle Thomas, under the direction of the latter a house to house canvass has been started on behalf of the repeal in the west side city.

ELECTRIC POWER PLANT SUBJECT FOR MONMOUTH

Monmouth—The possibilities of a diesel electric plan for Monmouth have for several months been the subject of an investigation by the city council and its committees on light, George W. Cooper and S. C. Halladay. After making a study of McMinville and Forest Grove which have such plants, the council has decided to employ an engineer to make a preliminary survey for a plan in Monmouth.

This survey will include costs, income, expense and, if the report will justify, application will be made to the Reconstruction Finance corporation for funds to finance the project. Forest Grove, which is twice the size of Monmouth, last year made a profit of \$14,000 and furnished city light to the amount of \$5,300 or a total of \$19,300 for the year. McMinville in three years has made a profit of \$120,000 and in the next two years expects to retire a \$90,000 water bond issue from the light profits. It is considered that Monmouth might do as well in proportion, but the council proposes to make sure that it will be a paying proposition before any action is taken to build the city.

They consider that as the city is now so deeply bonded such a plant must pay for itself in a few years and make immediate profits. If it will do that they consider it to be a good business proposition for it will, in a large measure, pay off the indebtedness of the city.

The council asks the citizens of Monmouth to refuse to sign any contracts for electric service with outside companies for if a city plant is installed it will deserve and need the support of every citizen. They promise to keep the public informed of developments and ask the support of the people of Monmouth.

Injured Truck Man Expected To Die

Silverton—Mrs. P. J. Radigan has received word from her brother-in-law, Eugene Noxon, who was critically injured last Wednesday when his truck went over a 500 foot deep ravine near Wallace, Idaho, that he is still unconscious and little hope is held for his recovery. He was working for the county and had a crew of men on the truck, all of whom jumped to safety as the truck started over the grade. His skull is badly fractured, his collar bone crushed and six ribs broken and he is suffering internal injuries. He has a wife and two small children.

PIONEER TRIBE WILL OBSERVE 4TH AT BASIN

Selo—Nearly four score and 10 years of high hopes and achievements, tribulations and reverses, Indians and fur traders will be observed at a reunion July 4 of Thomas, Shelton and Bilyeu families on the Thurston Thomas farm, known as Thomas Basin, situated 12 miles east of Selo, according to announcement made this week by Riley Shelton, a son of one of the pioneer Sheltons who settled near here 87 years ago.

Frederick Thomas and family arrived in Linn county, Territory of Oregon, in 1846; Haman Shelton, Sr., and family came in 1847, and William Bilyeu and other Bilyeu families followed in 1852. Shelton stated in outlining a tentative program proposed for the coming reunion of the pioneer families.

"The Thomas and Shelton families settled on Thomas creek and took up donation land claims, and the creek was named for Mr. Thomas. The Bilyeu took up claims on Bilyeu creek, a foothill water course christened in honor of the first settlers," Shelton continued, explaining that Thurston Thomas, present owner of the farm on which descendants of the three frontier families will round-up on the nation's birthday this year, is a grandson of the original Frederick Thomas. Thurston Thomas now resides at Stayton. Grounds are being prepared in a beautiful grove by Claire Thomas, a great-grandson of the pioneer, with the assistance of others. Platform, seats, tables and other necessities are being arranged. Cool mountain water will be available, basket dinner served, and speakers qualified to give accurate history of happenings 87 years ago, are expected to be present. Family histories will be related.

"The general public is invited to join in and come to this picnic with baskets of good eats. If anyone wants to make a speech, recite or render music to his own liking, come prepared," Shelton concluded in a happy strain characteristic of the Oregon pioneer.
