

SHARKEY MAY ENTER ON RING SHORT END BETTING

CARNERA MONEY FORCING ODDS TO EVEN MARK

New York, June 28 (AP)—For the first time in boxing history a heavyweight champion may enter the ring at short-end in the betting when Jack Sharkey ducks under the ropes in Madison Square Garden's Long Island bowl tomorrow night for his 15-round title defense against Primo Carnera.

Today Champion Jack was a bare 6 to 5 choice with some quotations as low as 11 to 10 and there were strong indications Carnera would be no worse than an even money bet, and perhaps a slight favorite, by fight time.

Just what has caused the rush of money on the mammoth Italian's chances had even the book-makers mystified, but it seemed possible Carnera's knockout victory over ill-fated Ernie Schaaf, as well as Sharkey's inactivity, may have played an important part.

As a matter of fact there has been nothing in the big Italian's previous bouts with first-class heavyweights to indicate any such thing. Sharkey himself had few, if any, uncomfortable moments when he outpointed Primo at Ebbets Field two years ago and a long list of other heavyweights, including King Levinsky, Jimmy Maloney, Paulino Uzcudun, Stanley Porcra, Hans Birke, Larry Gains and Art Lasky have traveled the full ten-round route against him. Gains, Porcra and Maloney all hold decisions over him at that distance.

On the face of things, the trend toward Carnera hardly seems justified. Sharkey has trained faithfully and well. No longer quite as fast as he was a few years ago, the Boston sailor nevertheless still is one of the world's smartest glove-swingers, a durable hard-punching veteran who, on his good nights, is all but unbeatable.

R. R. Boardman, Esther Arnold and Mildred Miller are in charge at Olinger. Since the opening of the playground season, June 15, there has been an average daily attendance of 350 youngsters.

Victoria, B. C., June 28 (AP)—Eight Americans, with the ranks of their "best threats" still undiminished, battled in the second round of the Pacific northwest amateur golf tournament today over the rolling slopes of the Oak Bay course.

With overwhelming victories for the most part in the opening day's play yesterday, three of the favorites, H. Chandler (Chan) Egan, of Medford, Ore., defending champion, Dr. O. F. Willing, of Portland, and young Albert (Scotty) Campbell, of Seattle, ran into stiffer opposition.

The rounds today included: Campbell vs. J. Todd, Victoria. Egan vs. D. Barrett, Victoria. Willing vs. J. R. Matson, Victoria.

Some "hot" golf was turned in yesterday, although most of the winners advanced by overwhelming scores. Campbell, Seattle city champion, romped off with a six-hole 68 in the morning round to take a five-hole lead over Dr. T. C. Sedden, Spokane, but was content with steady play in the afternoon, to win 7 and 6.

was the Boston Red Sox and St. Louis Browns who ripped the Yankees loose from the American league lead and now the Boston Braves appear to have taken up where the last place Phillies left off on the job of knocking the Cardinals deeper into second place in the National.

Outslugged by the Phillies in three out of four games, the Cards went to Boston yesterday and ran into an unbeatable band of pitching that gave them another defeat. Leo Mangum, who hadn't started a game since early May, blanked them with six hits, to beat Bill Walker in a brilliant mound duel, 1 to 0. Walker granted only three hits and neither flinger gave a pass.

The Boston run resulted from Leo Durocher's error on Hal Lee's hard grounder in the fifth. Al Spohrer sent Lee to third with a single and the latter scored on a force play.
