COTTON CODE HEARINGS HELD

Washington, June 29 (AP)—The cotton textile industrial conference today grappled with problems of contract adjustments to meet costs increased by the proposed trade code, leaving behind differences between employers and labor over wages and working hours.

W. L. Allen, deputy administrator, in announcing the next step in the recovery administration's effort for a business betterment program for textiles, said the hearings at the commerce department may close tomorrow.

Of considerable importance to operators is clause five of the code which constitutes the cotton textile industry committee, the drafters to assist in adjusting contracts for textiles should costs of production increase by reason of minimum wages and a maximum work week.

Some officials expressed surprise that possible price increases to the consumer have not figured in the testimony. So far in the hearing no spokesmen has discussed possibilities of price fixing under the code or what that price fixing might mean to the consuming public.

Manufacturers are concerned over difficulties of adjusting their operating schedules to the code by July 17.

Reconstruction of the North Santiam highway between Mill City and Niagara was advanced to the extent of \$50,000 or more of Marion county money.

The Independence-Brunks Corner secondary highway was put down for \$50,000 and a like amount was apportioned to improve the Dallas-Wallace Bridge secondary road near Buell, where a bridge contract was let yesterday. On this road another \$7500 was allowed for small bridges and culverts.

Relocation of the Pacific highway through Oregon City was also scheduled in portions of the program that had not yet been considered, and \$175,000 had been budgeted for improvement of the East Side Pacific highway entrance to Portland.

BRANTLEY JAILED ON MORALS CHARGE

Dallas, June 29—Walter P. Brantley, part owner of the Model meat market, is in jail here in lieu of \$1500 bail and facing a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

The case grew out of the investigation by county authorities and state police of the disappearance of a 17 year old girl a few days ago. Brantley was taken into custody near Detroit, in Marion county, shortly after midnight Wednesday by State Trooper George Thompson, and the pair brought to the Polk county jail.

Getting a line on the situation, Deputies Williams and Senter, with the state police, went to Stayton, Brantley's former home, but he could not be located. Officer Thompson, armed with a warrant, remained on the job and finally located the missing girl. Brantley has been engaged in business here for the past few months. The girl is being held for further questioning by District Attorney Elmer Barnhard of Independence.

Seattle Man Killed

McMinnville, June 29 (AP)—Max Bauer, 56, Seattle, was dead and his two daughters, Ruth 16, and Betty 12, were in the McMinnville hospital with serious injuries received in an automobile accident two miles south of Amity.

Bauer died instantly. Ruth suffered a possible fracture of the skull, while Betty received a possible fracture of the collar bone.

The accident occurred when Bauer attempted to pass a truck overtaken by A. G. Newman. Bauer's car left the highway, careened across the road and turned over twice.

Bauer's residence in Seattle was given as 721 West 125th street.

1675 STUDENTS LAST SEMESTER

Although enrollment reached 1675 students, the largest in the history of the school, resulting in more students being registered in each class, the work of Salem senior high school was handled with facility, according to a report filed with Superintendent Hug, detailing the year's activities. A decrease in failures in all departments and a general average of better grades is shown in the report.

The increased attendance, however, resulted in a greater burden upon the employes of the principal's office, because the teachers were compelled to spend more time with their classes.

The associated student's treasury shows a balance, although lack of cash kept many students from participating in many activities. All clubs included in the 35 organizations represented in the school report a balance in the checking accounts.

Languages proved the most attractive to students selected for the local chapter of the National Honor society, 11 of the 25 represented having named this subject as their major. Mathematics with its major, mathematics, while social science, science and commerce were each named by two honor students. One majored in home economics and another in music.

A central collection agency is advocated for the many activities which operate on a fee basis, ranging all the way from book rentals to towels. Approximately \$2500 was taken in from these agencies during the year.
