

SEWAGE PLANT PROGRAM TOLD TO ALBANY MEN

Albany—High lights in the movement to purify the Willamette river were given to the Albany city council and a group of citizens Wednesday evening by representatives of the Oregon-Antipollution League. W. T. Lambert, Portland, president of the league, was in charge of the meeting.

The movement is a co-ordination of efforts to unite all the cities on the Willamette river and its tributaries in a program of sewage disposal plant construction that will rid the river of sewage pollution. Others from Portland, who were present were Robert C. Delch, R. E. Koon, J. W. Cunningham, Kenneth Fitzgerald and Ed Averill.

The speakers impressed upon the Albany council and others that now was the opportune time to construct the sewage disposal plants. One of the chief reasons was that to push the projects now would afford unemployment relief.

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BROWNSVILLE BANK INVOLVED IN SUIT

Albany—A suit against the Bank of Brownsville, which closed its doors May 29, 1932, and A. A. Schramm, state superintendent of banks, was filed in circuit court here yesterday by F. M. Brown, W. J. Shelton and John F. Belts, representing persons who had paid their taxes to the bank for the bank to forward to the sheriff of Linn county.

The committee represents several dozen individuals, who in the aggregate, paid \$2,194.33 to the bank for tax payments.

The plaintiffs ask for a decree establishing their claim as a trust fund and an obligation of the defunct bank, that Supt. Schramm be declared the trustee of the fund and that he be enjoined from liquidating the assets of the bank until the \$2,194.33 item for tax payments be paid back to the individuals who entrusted them to the bank for tax paying purposes.
