

VINES ADVANCES TO QUARTER FINALS WIMBLEDON

AMERICAN ACE BEATS GERMAN TENNIS STAR

Wimbledon, Eng., July 1 (AP)—Ellsworth Vines, the American tennis ace, came through to the quarter-finals of the all-English singles championship today with a straight-set conquest of Dr. Daniel Prehn of Germany, 6-3, 6-2, 6-4, before a packed gallery including the king and queen.

Jack Crawford, ace of the Australian Davis cup tennis team, advanced to the quarter-finals with a straight-set triumph over A. C. Stedman of New Zealand, 6-1, 6-4, 6-2.

The French woman star, Mme. Rene Mathieu, had little trouble disposing of Miss Katherine Stammers, former English girl champion, 6-4, 6-0, and advanced to the quarter-finals.

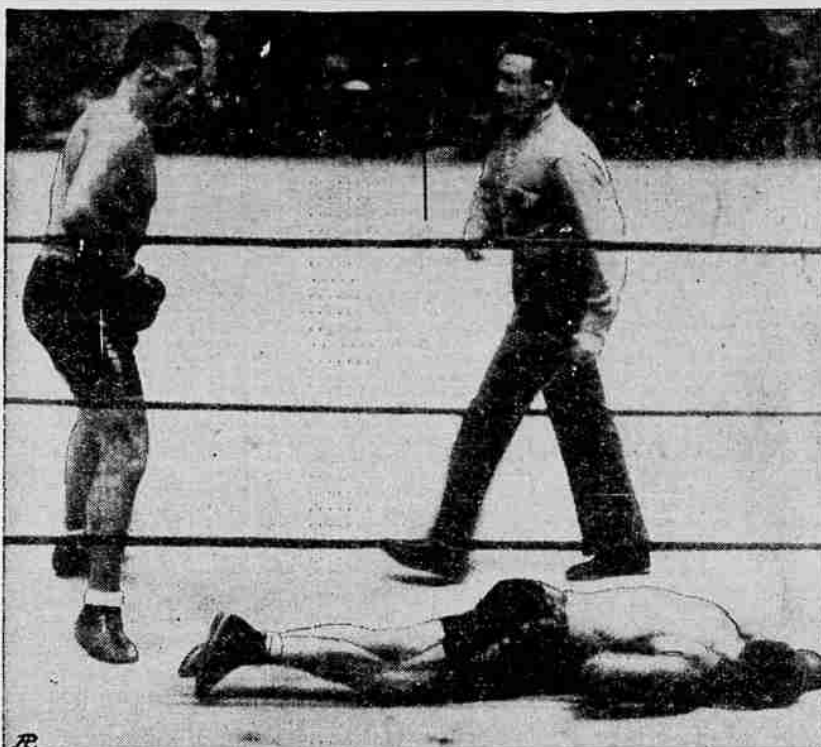
The tournament attracted another capacity crowd this afternoon, under a brilliant sun. Several women fainted in the crush and were attended by ambulance men and nurses.

Vines' victory put him into the quarter-finals along with Jack Crawford, his Australian rival and Lester Stofen, the tall Californian who had a close call yesterday.

The royal couple entered the stadium while Vines was leading Prehn 3-2 in the opening set and the American star, who holds the Wimbledon title, quickly gave them a brilliant exhibition of his stroking power.

Vines had his game under good control from the outset and was never in much danger of losing so much as a set. His service was particularly effective, the first ace Prehn a number of time or forcing weak returns that the champion "killed."

PORTLAND GAINS GROUND AS OAKS DROP ONE, 11-0

Manager Earl McNeely and his Sacramento Senators had about enough twilight baseball today to last them the entire season. The Californians sampled the Seattle innovation for the fourth time last night and suffered their third defeat of the week, 11-0.

George Burns, the Indian manager-first baseman, assigned the pitching duties to Hal Haid and personally attended to the batting. With his 19th and 20th homers of the season and a pair of singles he led a 10-hit assault on Bryan Sanders and Noonan. Haid held the senators hitless in the first five innings and allowed only four singles in the final frames.

Portland gained ground in the coast league pennant race with a 9-8 win over Oakland after being carried to two extra innings. The Oaks tied the count at 8-all with a 3-run rally in the eighth, after making ten errors Thursday, the Astors fielded in sparkling fashion last night, with Scott's sensational catch preventing a Portland score in the ninth. Six singles and three walks gave the Beavers six runs in the fifth and sent Lou McEvoy to the showers.

After dropping three in a row, the Missions recovered at San Francisco last night to turn back Hollywood, 4-2. Bill Phebus, former Oakland hurler, was staked to a 4-run lead in the opening inning and held it without trouble, limiting the Stars to five bingles. Los Angeles made it four straight over San Francisco, 6-4, to shove the Seals deeper into the cellar.

Cardinals' Indian Sign Continues to Hold Good Over New York Giants

The "Indian sign" which the St. Louis Cardinals hold over the New York Giants this season is standing them in good stead in their efforts to regain the National league lead.

The Cards haven't lost a game to the Giants this year, winning their seventh straight by a 1-0 count yesterday when Joe Medwick broke up a mound duel between Dazy Dean and Hal Schumacher by nailing a home run after two were out in the ninth. Thanks to Medwick's blow, the Cards now trail the pace setting Giants by only 2½ games.

For 8 2-3 innings, Schumacher had the best of the mound duel, giving only three hits to six off Dean, but the Giants couldn't get him a run. Meanwhile, the Washington Senators again pulled away in the American league race, breaking their tie with the New York Yankees by defeating Detroit's Tigers by a 2-1 count while the Yanks "blew" a 13-12 decision to the Cleveland Indians.

Brilliant fielding marked the Senator-Tiger tilt as Al Crowder and Tommy Bridges fought it out on the hill. A walk, a force out, Heinie Manush's single and Goose Goslin's fly brought in the winning run in the seventh. The Yanks pounded out a 9-2 lead in three innings but finally succumbed to a four run Indian rally in the ninth. Tony Lauer's error hurting plenty. NOISE FEATURE OF FIREWORKS

More noise and less set pieces will be the fireworks program next Tuesday night at the fairgrounds when Capital post of the American Legion holds its annual Fourth of July celebration. This arrangement will mean that most of the fireworks will be visible from virtually any place on the grounds.

The display will start with aerial maroons of 10-inch size. There will be sent up as notification of the start of the fireworks program. The display will consist of 25 divisions, being concluded by the explosion of a bomb, the heaviest made by the concern furnishing the fireworks and which can be heard at an extreme distance of 10 miles.

Between the first and the concluding numbers, there will be a wide variety of fireworks, including mines and shells, comic displays, such as wired fireworks chasing each other from one end of the field to the other, the "Battle of Verdun" wheel, characterized by extremely heavy reports as it revolves in the air; aerial sky wanderers, new and special made rockets travelling in the air for 10 seconds, and a giant searchlight parachute shell, which will light up the entire fairgrounds.

Prior to the final bomb the legion emblem in true colors 20 by 20 feet in size will be displayed.

The fireworks program will start promptly at 9:20 p. m. regardless of other features which may be in progress. Last year it was close to 11 o'clock before the fireworks exhibit started.

LODELL NAMES COACHING STAFF

Corvallis, July 1 (AP)—Carl Lodell, director of Athletics at Oregon State college, has announced the coaching line-up for the college in four major sports, football, baseball, basketball and track, for the coming seasons.

The staff is composed of Lon Stinner, Amory T. (Slats) Gill, Jim Dixon, Grant Swan and George Scott. All with the exception of Swan and Scott were coaching here last year. Stinner, who has been assistant football coach here since 1926, will head the football coaching staff. He will be assisted by Jim Dixon, assistant here since 1927, and George Scott who played half-back here in 1926-27, and was assistant backfield coach in 1928. Scott was coach of all sports at Baker high school the past four years.

Slats Gill will be freshman football coach replacing Vern Eilers who has been elected coach at Baker high school. Gill will again be head varsity basketball and baseball coach. He brought the Orange-men their first Pacific coast conference basketball championship last winter.

Scott will coach the fresh baseball and basketball teams. His teams at Baker won the right to enter the state tournament at Salem three times in the past four years.

Swan, who was graduated from Oregon State in 1922 and considered one of the greatest track men ever to represent the college, will relieve Stinner of the duties of head track coach. He also will be in charge of the training of all athletes and will be assisted in track by Jim Dixon, fresh track coach here for the past two years.
