Holman Hollers

Asserting that "Governor Meier is mentally as weak as physically lazy" and that "all he is doing is 'yessing' Einzig without acquainting himself with the merits of various bids" State Treasurer Rufus Holman has renewed his attack upon the executive and the state purchasing agent. He declares:

The time has arrived when the state board of control should conduct its affairs on a business basis. The law provides specifically that all state purchases and contracts shall be awarded on the basis of the low bid and not on the so-called best bid as alleged by William Einzig, state purchasing agent.

We agree with Mr. Holman that the members of the board of control should conduct state affairs on a business basis. The first requisite is that its members be on their jobs more than a few hours one day a week. But how can it be on a business basis when only one member of the three attends meetings and rarely is any member at the state house?

At the last meeting of the board when the bids were awarded of which Mr. Holman complains, only the governor was present. Neither Mr. Holman nor Mr. Hoss appeared. What right then has Mr. Holman to attack awards made when he was himself "to physically lazy" if not "too mentally weak" to tend to the state business for which he draws a salary?

The time to protest contracts is before they are let. Mr. Holman passed up this opportunity and forfeited right of criticism. Belated protests savor of politics—and their purpose apparently is to vent spite on the governor who appointed him and on the purchasing agent, whose appointment he voted for, and who unlike his superiors, is always on the job.

Our George Out

George L. Baker retires today after having been mayor of Portland for 16 years and before that councilman for nearly as long. His many years of service made him an institution and had it not been for the unrest created by the depression and capitalized by demagogues, he probably would not have voluntarily retired but continued a lifetime in office.

Mr. Baker was admirably equipped for his task and grew with his service. He sensed what the people wanted and during most of his career basked in the light of popularity. During his public career, Portland doubled in population and under his guidance became the metropolitan city it is today.

Mr. Baker was an actor by profession, and knows how to dramatize his every move, and to secure first page publicity for it. For many years he sporadically advertised Portland by his stunts and became nationally known because of them. Whether in greeting Mary Garden with a kiss or hitting the sawdust trail with the fair Aimee, "Our George" was always in the limelight.

Mr. Baker was a born greeter and genial glad-hander and a community go-getter of the most successful type. There never was a gathering too large nor one too small for him to grace by his presence and oratory. He was indefatigable in his efforts for every organization calling upon him as well as the community or state.

Despite the tens of millions expended under Mr. Baker's regime, there has never been a scandal to involve him. And of cities of its size, Portland ranks among the cleanest and most law abiding. Our George leaves an enviable record and is followed in his return to private life by the best wishes of citizens of the entire state.

No Longer the Sucker

It begins to look as though we had a president who knows how to handle the European nations and call their bluffs without Uncle Sam's losing his shirt as has repeatedly happened in the past. Mr. Roosevelt is not posing as a world savior—he is mainly concerned with saving the United States. If Europe wants to default in debts to America, to spend the money in armament, there is no reason why America should stabilize its currency, especially as the unbalancing was done by its nations at our expense.

The threatened disruption is merely a bluff and is true to the form of international conferences. But it provides the first test of Roosevelt's ability as an international diplomat. There will be breaks and reconciliations and finally high fatality resolutions before adjournment leaves the world just about where it was when the parley started.

Uncle Sam intends evidently to get something for himself in return for favors asked by Europe. Hitherto America has been the goat—always giving, never receiving, and Uncle Sam is tired of rescuing Europe from disaster and paying all the costs. So Mr. Roosevelt is using European tactics in dealing with the Europeans—so the French are angry, England amazed, and the others, except Russia, bewildered.

The United States for many years sought currency stabilization, sought the restoration of the gold standard, and Europe's answer was to go off the gold standard, resort to inflation, raid American markets and turn deaf ears to stabilization. As long as depreciated money could circumvent our tariff walls, Europe opposed stabilization and even raided our gold reserve. Now that the cheapened dollar is raiding world markets, America is pilloried for refusing to play Europe's game and stabilize.

The United States does not need to worry about stabilization. The American dollar is the most stable currency in the world, and backed by the largest of gold reserves. And our embargo prevents France and other raiders from further enriching themselves by gold raids. The more the dollar slumps abroad, the greater the benefit to exporters.

Uncle Sam is no longer the international sucker. He will get what he wants this time and Europe pay for the getting.

Insanity Cases Said To Remain Static

Utica, N. Y. (UP)—There are no more persons insane now than there were 100 years ago, according to Richard H. Hutchings, superintendent of the Utica State Hospital. Dr. Hutchings reported there has been an increase in the number of persons admitted to hospitals, but this is due, he said, to the changed attitude of the public toward institutions for the care of the insane and not to any increase per capita in the number of insanity cases.

Goat Climbs Tree To Eat Its Leaves

Oakdale, Cal. (UP)—J. L. Sawyer's tree-climbing goat was grazing in a treeless pasture today. The transfer came when Sawyer, discovering a number of almond trees badly mutilated, found in a tree one of the goats he used to lead a herd of 4,500 lambs. The animal, he said, had jumped a five-foot fence, surrounded a grazing field, climbed the trees in the adjoining orchard and eaten foliage while straddling limbs.

The National Whirligig

Washington—The government's confidential estimates are that industrial production this month was more than 80 per cent of normal—the averages between 1923 and 1925 being considered normal.

That is good news, but not as good as it sounds. Purchasing power has not kept pace. Factory employment will be less than 65 per cent normal. Payrolls of 89 manufacturing groups will be about 46 per cent normal, department store sales around 30 per cent. Those figures represent splendid increases, but they also disclose the inner problem. We must boost the purchasing power.

That is the main objective behind everything your government now is doing here.

The big thing now is payrolls. For the same months carried in the chart the payroll adjusted index was: December (1931) 55.8; January (1932) 52.4; July 39.5; September 42.1; November 41.8; December 40.9; January (1933) 39.2; February 40.9; March 36.9; April 38.6; and May 42.0.

You can see that production jumped 16 points between March and May 31; payrolls only 5 points. The Industrial Control setup is trying to bring these two figures nearer a balance. You cannot maintain industrial production without a substantial increase in purchasing power.

Some people say a greater wage spread might not increase buying. It is plain hokey. The average factory wage is around \$12 a week. You cannot do much hokeying on that. Nearly every dollar of it goes into buying.

The happy side of the situation is that our officials recognize the problem and are going after it. That is as much as you can hope for.

The sad side of it is that some manufacturers have stepped up production without looking for purchasing power. The textile industry has been running 106 per cent of the 1925-26 average. The shoe industry has been going 109 per cent.

They are afraid of inflation and the processing taxes. They are running night and day to get in on the production they can before the government increases further the prices of raw materials. Also, before the government can put on the tax.

This excess production is being stored. It may create a surplus production problem if it goes much further.

The selling end also is not keeping up with production generally. Retail sales increases have been shown recently in automobiles, cigarette and refrigerators. That is about all.

However, nearly every major industry has been increasing employment. Only the chemicals showed a decrease during the last six weeks.

These figures make it as plain as the nose on any manufacturer's face that we must cooperate with the Industrial Control movement to boost and spread wages. It is a matter of self-preservation and not a patriotic appeal. It is a selfish business necessity and not theoretical altruism.

At the rate production is running we will soon have our heels over our head again, unless they cooperate.

They will.

We have been nudging up very close to the Russians at London. Members of our delegation have been lunching privately and conversing frequently with the Soviet delegate M. Litvinoff. At the same time our government economists here have been handing out stories that the trade benefits of recognition are being over-estimated. What seems to be in the wind is that the administration is edging toward recognition, but is not prepared to leap yet. The indications are clear that all we are waiting for is the right psychological moment.
