Art Exhibit Brings Old World's Beauty To Salem's Door

Color, radiant and gay, filtering as does the sun through thatched leaf and limb, reflects to the viewer an atmosphere of foreign lands. An artist who seems to have loved and followed the sun with his personal technique of artistry is the present M. Hubert Robert, who has in his veins the blood of his grandfather, a great painter of the XVIIIth century. M. Hubert Robert was not content to follow in the footsteps of his forebears; he wanted now and then a touch of his own.

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A citizen of the world, roaming and painting from Morocco to his own United States, he has crested the globe. "As a whole," says Charles Gaston in speaking of Hubert Robert, "in his magic of light and color he goes beyond the domain of painting and graphic art on a lighter sphere. He enters the sphere of musical harmonies. His skies, his shadows, his silhouettes are delightfully wrapped in blue. The atmosphere of the tropics and the west is everywhere on his canvas. His foregrounds are powerful, his backgrounds recede to a point of vanishing into the sky. The multitude of halftones run from a vigorous key to the infinite theme of quiet radiance."

M. Hubert-Robert's work is much known, his reproductions having been made for L'illustration, a world renowned French periodical. He was commissioned by the French government during the war to paint officially for them.

Salem art lovers who have thrilled to the works of this artist have been much pleased with two paintings in particular. "Jerusalem," the holy city, with the first morning sun rays playing on the cupola of the Omar Mosque and light running and playing from roof to wall—the sky pierced through with pure sun shows balance, color harmonies and texture which are all delightful to the observer. The second picture, "Egyptian Moonlight," with the translucent blue of the Egyptian nights is of quality never met elsewhere. It shows tonal aspects of blue color blended—a nocturne in blue, perhaps.

Paintings of this artist now hang in the famous Musée du Luxembourg, the personal gallery of the King of Belgium, the city museum in Washington, D. C., the city museum of Seattle and the San Francisco palace of the Legion of Honor.
