Man Makes Good On 25-Year-Old Oath

Cleburne, Tex. (AP)—More than a quarter of a century ago, O. H. Poole, publisher of the Cleburne Morning Review, and James "Burrhead" Lowry, pioneer newspaper man of Honey Grove, entered into a solemn compact.

"No matter where I am," Lowry vowed, "I'll attend your funeral and make a five-minute speech."

"I'll do the same if you die first," Poole replied. "Only, since I'm not a speech-maker, I'll leave that part out."

Recently, Poole stood beside the bier of his long-time friend, and fulfilled his vow.

SEEK VOTE ON POWER BOARD

Mandamus action was filed in the state supreme court here today to compel the secretary of state to place on the ballot at the special election July 21 the names of Peter Zimmerman, Morton Tompkins and Dr. Albert Slaughter, candidates for state power commissioners under the 1933 grand power act.

The plaintiffs filed their declarations of candidacy on May 31, but on June 6 a referendum petition was presented which suspended temporarily the operation of the entire power law.

Subsequent to the filing of the referendum petition the state, upon relation of Attorney General Van Winkle, launched a suit in circuit court here to enjoin operation of the referendum. The attorney general alleged that a large number of names on the referendum petitions were obtained through fraud.

This was followed on June 27 by the issuance of a temporary injunction restraining the secretary of state from placing the referendum on the ballot. The petitioners were given 60 days in which to file a bill of particulars which means that the referendum cannot be referred to the voters at the special election.

Plaintiffs in the mandamus proceeding alleged that certain features of the power act are now in effect.

SPEED UP PLANS FOR PUBLIC BUILDINGS

Washington, July 1 (AP)—Promising highway construction jobs for at least 100,000 of the unemployed within six weeks, the public works administration today hastened employment for thousands more on federal building projects.

Secretary of Interior Ickes summoned a meeting of the cabinet board in charge of the \$3,300,000,000 public works program to discuss building plans submitted by more than 60 federal agencies. The proposed projects include many post-offices, extensive construction at army posts and a variety of other work on which hundreds of millions will be spent.

As \$400,000,000 allotted among the states for highway construction became actually available today, Donald H. Sawyer, public works administrator, declared "unemployed throughout the country in two weeks will start moving off relief rolls and onto pay rolls."

TORNADOES RAVAGE DAKOTA VILLAGES

Mitchell, S. D., July 1 (AP)—Two tornadoes, one south and one northeast of Mitchell, accompanied by hail and rain ravaged nearby territory last night, killing livestock and damaging property.

Heavy hail in the vicinity of Loomis, Letcher, Fulton and Farmer, damaged crops severely and broke windows in many homes.

The tornado which struck Stickney flattened barns on farms and damaged homes. The Lutheran church was reported destroyed.

Tumbled by the tornado, a church, a school house, an elevator, five barns and numerous small buildings lay in ruins at Salem.

CONVICT ATTACKS GUARDS, SUICIDES

Folsom Prison, Calif., July 1 (AP)—Running amuck with a razor, George B. Kelly, 45, Humboldt county convict, slashed three prison guards today, then cut his own throat. He was not expected to live. Kelly leaped from line while marching to breakfast.

William E. Townsend, assistant turnkey, Guard Clarence E. Chappell and Guard Robert R. Cain were slightly cut before the apparently crazed man was subdued. He jerked away, drew a second razor and slashed his own throat while being led to the warden's office.

The funeral was conducted by the Los Angeles lodge of Elks, 99, Barbara Maurel, mezzo-soprano, sang. The body will be cremated.

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SUICIDE'S BODY ON RIVER BANK

While plowing at the southern end of a field between the Salem-Dallas highway and the river, C. N. Hathaway early Saturday afternoon discovered the body of a man lying on the bank of the river a few feet below the surface of the field. Deputy Sheriff Walter B. Gerth was notified and informed Deputy Coroner, Thomas, of Dallas.

Investigation revealed the man had apparently committed suicide with a .32 automatic, approximately a week or ten days ago. While the body was fairly well preserved, the man's face had been eaten away by maggots, making identification impossible. He was around 40 years of age, with dark hair. The only identification marks found at a cursory investigation was his hat, over his face, which had the name of a Sacramento, Calif., store.

The body was found on its back, one leg doubled back at the knee. It was clad in dark blue trousers with a small reddish stripe, a white light four-band tie, with a blue shirt and grayish sweater coat and tan oxford.

BUDDY ROGERS BACK IN FILM

GIN MARRIAGE ACT CUTS JUNE LICENSES

The new "gin" marriage law has caused an acute depression in the June bride market for Marion county, according to figures completed today by Harlan Jude, marriage license clerk at the county clerk's office. He has prepared comparative figures for number of licenses issued from 1921 down to the June just ended, with exception of 1925 and 1926.

In June this year but 49 licenses were issued, the lowest number for any June since a record has been kept of the total number. In 1932 63 were issued during June.

The figures for the respective years are as follows: 1921, 61; 1922, 78; 1923, 74; 1924, 49; 1925, 62; 1926, 60; 1927, 78; 1928, 60; 1929, 78; 1930, 60; 1931, 57; 1932, 63; 1933 49.

The law this year also had a little advantage over succeeding years as it did not become effective until June 9 and there was quite a little rush during the early days of June just preceding the law's becoming into effect. On the same basis next June should see a further dropping off in licenses.

MARKED GAIN IN LABOR IN OREGON

San Francisco, July 1 (AP)—The Federal Reserve bank of San Francisco announced today its survey of Oregon employment for May showed a marked gain. The state's seasonally adjusted index rose to 61 per cent of the 1926 monthly average, compared with 55 in April, and 55 also in May, 1932.

Although aggregate wages paid increased over April, the total was less than in May last year. The seasonal total payroll index was 38, compared with 35 in April and 41 in May, 1932.

The month's best gains were in metal textile and lumber industries, with other industries, except foods, making some gains.

St. John, N. B., July 1 (AP)—A terrific storm over the Bay of Fundy was reported today to have caused thousands of dollars damage and raised fears for the safety of a dozen or more fishermen.

WESTERN UNION RESTORES WAGES

New York, July 1 (AP)—The 10 per cent wage reductions ordered by the Western Union Telegraph company on August 1, 1932, was ordered restored today following a meeting of company officials with representatives of the association of Western Union employees.

The company announced it had taken action "as soon as it was possible to do so to recognize the fine spirit of loyalty and cooperation with which the employees received the deduction."

The order is retroactive to August 1, 1932.

San Francisco Has Heavy Loss by Fire

San Francisco, July 1 (AP)—Firemen continued today their all-night battle to prevent the spread of flames which destroyed 3,000,000 feet of hardwood lumber in the heart of San Francisco's industrial district.

Officials of the Kirschmann Hardwood company, owners of the lumber, placed the loss at \$500,000.

ENTIRE ROAD TO BE REBUILT

Motor traffic between Salem and Portland will be flowing smoothly and swiftly over a completely reconstructed highway in another year if projects now under way in the hands of the highway commission and the bureau of public roads can be completed in that time.

Completion of the pavement widening between Brooks and Aurora this summer will provide a reconstructed modern road to the entire distance from Salem to Oregon City this fall, and two other jobs projected out of federal funds will complete the program within another year.

Two hundred and fifty thousand dollars of Oregon's \$6,100,000 of federal grant money has been set aside for construction of a new highway route through Oregon City to connect up with the east side super highway from Oregon City to Milwaukee, which will be opened to traffic by July 15. The route through Oregon City will probably follow along the bluff overlooking the river and business district and will connect with the super highway over a viaduct over the Southern Pacific tracks.

Another \$50,000 of federal money has been allocated to the construction of an under-pass beneath the railroad tracks at Milwaukee, and \$175,000 will be utilized in construction of a new highway entrance into Portland from Milwaukee.

RESURFACING BIDS OPENED ON JULY 11

Bids on the readvertised project for resurfacing and widening the pavement on the Pacific highway between Brooks and Aurora will be opened at a meeting of the state highway commission in Portland July 11, it was announced at the highway department today.

Originally the letting had been scheduled for July 7, but the extension was made to give contractors more time to prepare their bids.

First bids on the project, averaging 30 per cent more than the engineers' estimates, were rejected by the commission last Wednesday. In that call for bids the project was divided into two units. In the new call it will be split into three units of approximately five miles each to enable smaller contractors to bid, and to speed up the work, which must be completed by October 1.

Low bids on the combined units at the first letting aggregated \$338,000.

RECEIVER ASKED FOR PRIMO CARNERA

New York, July 1 (AP)—A supreme court order signed today by Justice John L. Walsh requires Primo Carnera to show cause Monday why all the money received from winning the world heavyweight championship should not be placed in the hands of a receiver.

The order was obtained by American attorneys for Emelia Terani, a London waitress, who is seeking to collect \$14,616.03 judgment she obtained in a breach of promise case against Carnera in London courts last April.

Carnera recently filed a petition in bankruptcy.

The funeral was conducted by the Los Angeles lodge of Elks, 99, Barbara Maurel, mezzo-soprano, sang. The body will be cremated.

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BONNET SEES WORLD CHAOS IN CURRENCIES

Paris, July 1 (AP)—Finance minister Georges Bonnet, back from London, reported to the cabinet today that the world economic conference was deadlocked, pending President Roosevelt's approval of a plan for central banks to halt fluctuations in currencies.

The cabinet unanimously approved Bonnet's course at London, including his stout defense of the gold standard. Regret was expressed at the meeting that speculation particularly in the American dollar was interfering with the stability of currencies.

French government officials painted a black picture of Europe's future in the event that currencies ran wild, visualizing a situation that combined with delicate political positions in Germany and Austria might precipitate a rush to arms that would bring danger of war.

Anxiety to halt the violent fluctuations in currency of the last week was acute. A prominent member of the government told the United Press that France almost certainly would be forced off the gold standard if the dollar's value dropped until the franc was worth six cents. It was worth 4.97 cents at the opening of the foreign exchange trading today.

If France abandoned gold, he said, Holland, Switzerland and Belgium would be forced off thus creating chaos, with every major currency let loose for a wild battle to depreciate currency values.

NO ARRESTS MADE FOR AUTO LICENSES

Portland, July 1 (AP)—If you drive your car to the license bureau to get the new 1933 license plates you're liable to arrest by either state or local police, it was held here today.

"Old automobile plates became void at midnight and if you drive, it is at the risk of being arrested," local authorities told today motorists who called, asking information as to whether the law would be "in effect" immediately.

No arrests had been made up to a late hour today, however.

COTTON WAGES TOO LOW ASSERTS GREEN

Washington, July 1 (AP)—William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, said today the action of cotton mill owners in voluntarily agreeing to raise the minimum wage in the industry to \$12 a week was "very pleasing but not enough."

Green also said he still believed the 40-hour week proposed for the industry was much too long.

The manufacturers yesterday proposed an increase of \$2 in the basic rates which they originally had set at \$10 in the south and \$11 in the north but adhered to the 40-hour week schedule.

Dr. Alexander Sachs, chief economist for the national recovery administration, corroborated their contention that a reduction to 40 hours was sufficient to absorb the industry's idle workers.

Green said he still believed the proper regulation for the industry would provide a minimum wage of between \$14 and \$16, and a 30-hour working week with no restriction on the number of shifts a mill might operate.
