Woodburn—The Beecher-Killian Mortuary will be opened in Woodburn July 20. The new mortuary will be located in the Kennedy building at the corner of Front and West Lincoln streets, formerly occupied by the Ford garage. The model inside and out and when finished will be one of the most modern and up to date funeral homes in the valley. The chapel will seat 135 people. There will be a family room, music room, slumber room, office, lavatories, modern preparation room and a large foyer which can be opened up and used in connection with the chapel.

George C. Beecher, son of Dr. Dale X. Beecher of Salem, will be in charge and with his wife residing at the Allen apartments. Mr. Beecher is a graduate of the Cincinnati college of embalming, an institution of world-wide renown and is a member of Pi Sigma Eta, national embalming honorary. He served his apprenticeship with the Beecher-Killian mortuary at Salem and after returning from Cincinnati was employed in the Piusel funeral home at Chehalis, Wash. In Cincinnati he worked with Mack Johnson, national selected mortician. He also attended Oregon State college and University of Oregon.

Mr. Killian is connected with the Salem Mortuary and previously maintained the Killian and Son funeral home in Salem for 20 years. The new firm will handle business through the Salem Mortuary until the building at Woodburn is completed.

SUICIDE'S BODY NOT IDENTIFIED

Dallas—Identity of the man who apparently committed suicide along the river bank about quarter of a mile from the railroad crossing on the Salem-Dallas highway still remains a mystery. Reports that the body was that of Gus Ingram, independence man missing for several days, were refuted by Deputy Coroner Thomas after an examination of the body. Ingram, the officers were told by several intimates of the missing man, had a full set of false plates while the dead man had his own teeth.

The head was badly decomposed and identification by this means is impossible. A complete examination of the body at the mortuary revealed that he had been shot through the chest near the heart and not in the head as was believed at first. While there is every indication that the man died by his own hand, Deputy Coroner Thomas admits the case might be "anything" and an effort will be made to establish identity through his finger prints.

The man had dark or nearly black hair, was apparently between 35 and 40 years of age, weighed between 140 and 150 pounds and was five feet five inches tall. Deputy Coroner Thomas states. He was clad in dark blue trousers with a reddish stripe, blue shirt, grayish sweater coat, tan oxfords and a tan-green four-in-hand necktie. His hat of a light tan color was placed over his face when found and bore the name of a Sacramento, Calif., clothing store.
