Legion Celebration Draws Thousands To Fair Grounds for Day

Several thousand persons attended the Fourth of July celebration staged Tuesday at the state fairgrounds by the American Legion. The morning program was devoted to stunts, races and contests for youngsters with the afternoon occupied by the Ed Wright out-door show and riders from the Columbia Hunt club at Portland. Claude McKenney, general chairman, is busy making a check upon financial returns. Approximately 5000 attended the Reed-Jones championship match in front of the grand stand at night while many others witnessed the fireworks display and remained for the dancing.

Formal observance of the 157th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence was held in the morning with Captain John W. Beard, of Portland, chaplain of the Oregon national guard, voicing a call to patriotism and tribute to American soldiers. Brief remarks were given by Jack Eakin, of Dallas, state commander of the American Legion, and by Allan Carson, commander of Capital Post No. 9, of Salem. An exhibition was given by the national championship drum corps of Salem with music furnished during the day by the American Legion cadet band and the Salem Killie band.

Several hundred Salem youngsters took part in the morning contests with adults admitted for only one event—the fat man's race, won by Dr. Lloyd Hockett with E. P. Falt, second.
