There is possibility of a reduction in the force at the high school and at the junior high due to the voters in non-high school districts voting against bus transportation of students.

HONOR GUARD FOR SLAIN COP

Portland, July 6 (AP)—Members of the Oregon state police and of the national guard provided an honor guard here today for the body of State Policeman Milo Baucum who was shot to death by two youths on Sessou mountain, in southern Oregon July 2.

State policemen who were his comrades and members of the national guard met the train on which the body arrived from Medford. State Patrolman E. C. Snow accompanied the body to Portland. State officers in charge of Captain Wayne Gurdane comprised the honor guard, and an escort company of B. company, service company, 186th infantry, national guard, and P. company, 163d infantry and the 186th infantry band made up the cortege which led the procession. Baucum, commanded headquarters company, 3d battalion, 186th infantry, at Medford.

The body will lie in state until 1 p. m. Friday when services will be held at the Portland crematorium. Dr. J. J. Staib, pastor of Sunnyside congregational church, will officiate.

Patrolman Baucum was shot to death when he stopped two California youths, John Barrier, 17, and Harry Bowles, 21, driving a stolen car. Police said Barrier admitted riddling the officer's body with bullets. Both face first degree murder charges. They are in jail at Grants Pass.

RESERVE OFFICERS DUTY ASSIGNMENTS

Active duty assignments for 68 reserve officers in the Oregon reserve area have been authorized by corps area headquarters in San Francisco, according to word received here today by Lieut. Kenneth Dalton, president of the Marion Polk reserve officers chapter. This means that approximately 10 Salem officers who have applied for the training this summer, will receive camp orders at once.

Of special interest to the local reserve chapter is the provision authorizing the entire twenty-percent of field officers of the services to be sent to the medical corps. Probably two-thirds of the membership of the Salem group are medical doctors or dentists.

Reserve officers who are not called to active duty during the summer will continue their range work under the direction of a regular army officer assigned to instruct duty in this district, Lieut. Dalton declared.

PROTEST SAWYER ON WORKS BOARD

Portland, July 6 (AP)—A special dispatch to the Journal today from Washington, D. C., said that because Robert W. Sawyer, publisher of the Bend Bulletin, is considered to be opposed to municipal ownership, "protest and remonstrance" against his appointment as a member of the advisory committee of the public works administration in Oregon, has been received at the office of Senator McNary.

The protest, the dispatch said, was signed by Mayor J. F. Bosch of Bend; by Mayor J. R. Roberts of Redmond; and by some officers of the Deschutes county Pomona grange.

Counterfeiter Held In Southern Oregon
Medford, Ore., July 6 (AP)—Edward Wilbur, 65, said to be a former Leavenworth convict, was arrested at Applegate Wednesday by Secret Service Agent William McSwain on a charge of counterfeiting.

He is charged with having made counterfeit money which was alleged passed by Donald Campbell, 21, and Truman Phillips, 19. The two youths were held under \$2500 bail each.

Langhorne, Pa., July 6 (AP)—Two small boys, Buster Donus, 8, and his brother, Jack, 6, state police reported were kidnaped from the front porch of their home in Parkland, near here, this afternoon.

Children who had been playing with the two boys told police several men drove up to the house, located along the Lincoln highway, pulled the boys into their automobile and sped away.

The car headed toward Philadelphia. Police endeavored to learn whether the boys might have been driven away by some member of their family.

TO FORCE STATES TO BALANCE BUDGETS

Washington, July 6 (AP)—Budget Director Douglas is seeking the backing of President Roosevelt for a federal policy which would force states to balance their budgets before public works funds are allocated to them it was learned today.

Douglas has discussed the proposal with cabinet members and the president.

Military Funeral For Slain Officer

Medford, Ore., July 6 (AP)—Funeral services for the late Milo Baucum, state police trooper who was slain by two auto thieves last Saturday were held at the army here Wednesday. National guard companies from Medford and Ashland, 27 state policemen of Oregon and California, and hundreds of Rogue valley residents attended the services which were conducted by the national guard.

Brigadier General Thomas E. Riley, commander of the 82nd infantry, led the military procession which escorted the body to and from the auditorium. The body was sent to Portland last night where final services will be held Friday at the crematorium.

San Francisco, July 6 (AP)—F. W. Bradley, 70, noted mining engineer and president of Alaska Juneau and Bunker Hill and Sullivan Mining companies, died today at his home here, Bradley, born in Nevada City, had been in mining all of his life. He was recipient of high awards from mining societies. His widow, his mother and four sons survive.

CLAIMED GYPED IN FORECLOSURE SALE

George L. Pro and Sadie Pro have filed in circuit court objections to confirmation of sale in the matter of foreclosure filed against them by August Kohberger claiming an "unconscionable advantage" has been taken in buying in Salem residence property for \$600. Affidavits of J. F. Ulrich, M. B. Stegner and Horace L. Masters, Salem real estate men, all declare the valuation of the property to be around \$1500. In addition to a profit of \$900 they allege a deficiency judgment of \$834.95 faces them.

They state that in March, 1927, they borrowed \$2350 on the property and that with reasonable depreciation due to conditions the property still has a valuation of \$1500. They include photographs of the home with their objections and affidavits to prove the points they raise.

Return on an execution in the case of Union Central Life Insurance company against Joseph W. LaFollette shows property sold to plaintiff for \$18,594.64.

LIBERTY LOGANS SELL FOR 2 1-2 CENTS

Liberty—The Salem Berry Growers association met at the Liberty hall Wednesday evening to notify the growers at which cannery to deliver their loganberries. The association sold their logans to the cannery for 2 1/2 cents. The picking price was set at 3 cents with 1/2 cent bonus for pickers who help until the job is finished.

REBEL WARSHIP REACHES HONGKONG

Hongkong, China, July 6 (AP)—A warship operated by a rebel crew which deserted the North China government anchored at the mouth of Pearl river today, while its officers began negotiations with the Cantonese government.

Reports were current the rebels offered the ship for sale, but that Canton officials refused it.

The warship came here from Tsingtao.

Salt Lake City (AP)—The ranks of G.A.R. men in Utah are thinning fast, there being only 23 left in the state. At a recent convention only four of the 23 were able to attend, and three of those were Salt Lake City residents, where the convention was held.

Newspaper Ads Show Increase In June

Washington, July 6 (AP)—An increase in newspaper advertising and a further decrease in radio advertising expenditures in May was reported today by the department of commerce.

Newspaper advertising lineage in May was only 11 per cent less than in May, 1932, compared with an average reduction of 22 per cent in the first five months of the year. Expenditures for magazine advertising also dropped in May.

RIOTOUS FORESTERS SENT BACK HOME

Pendleton, July 6 (AP)—Sixteen young men from New York, stationed at the Bull Prairie forestation camp in Grant county, Umatilla national forest, will soon be on their way home, the result of a discharge from camp following fighting and rioting which occurred yesterday.

State police in this district, and Morrow county officials were called in to quell the trouble.

All but 52 of the 230 men in the camp are from the state of New York. Camp officials said those from New York City have been "very troublesome."

HERRIOT DEFENDS ROOSEVELT'S STAND

Paris, July 6 (AP)—Former Premier Herriot defended President Roosevelt's stand before the world economic conference in his newspaper *Ere Nouvelle* today.

He asked the French for a better understanding with the United States and warned that "an association in which the Anglo-Saxons are a part is sufficient to assure world peace."

Earth Tremor Felt In California City

Tokyo, July 6 (AP)—A slight earthquake was felt here at 11 a. m. today. No damage was reported.

Long Beach, Cal., July 6 (AP)—A sharp earthquake shock was felt here last night.

Mrs. Mabel Ahrendt, 46, died of fright and heart disease.

Long Beach was the center of a major earthquake last March, when a series of shocks caused more than 100 deaths in the area and resulted in heavy property damage.

ORPHAN BOY TO GET FINE HOME

Omaha, Neb., July 6 (AP)—The portals of a dream world opened today for Peter Christopoulos, 12, who has spent his entire life in an orphanage.

Peter has been adopted by a millionaire. He starts the trip to his new home in New Jersey today, and it will be his first train ride.

"Am I happy?" was about all he could say.

It was his smile that won him a home. Orphaned by the death of his parents when an infant, Peter lived in the St. James orphanage until he completed the eighth grade when he was 12.

Then he was transferred to Father Flanagan's boys' home here. He is the subject for the boys' home band. His photograph with his winning smile appeared recently in a boys' journal.

Jean Strenge, wealth silk dyer, saw in the photograph a likeness to his own 16-year-old son, Henry, who was drowned 18 months ago while attempting to save the life of a companion, who had broken through the ice while skating at Green Pond, N. J.

Strenge wrote Father Flanagan and offered to provide Peter with all the advantages he had intended for his own son.

He will be sent to college after he completes his high school course. His musical inclinations will be fostered. The finest voice teachers in New York will be at his disposal. And in the bargain he will get a sister, Strenge's 14-year-old daughter Jeanne. Peter too will be 14, on July 16.

"I'm going to tell them all my faults," Peter said.

AGED WIDOW LOSES 3 LIBERTY BONDS

A widow woman living in Salem suffered a serious misfortune on the afternoon of July 4 when she lost two envelopes, one containing \$300 in Liberty bonds and the other \$40 in currency. The loss leaves the widow entirely without money, and the finder will relieve a case of serious distress if the bonds and money are left with the Capital Journal, to be returned to their owner. A reward is offered.

The bonds had been taken from a local bank to be sold. There were three of the bonds, each of \$100 denomination. The bonds and the money were lost somewhere between 17th and D streets and the Gile cannery.

The bonds were purchased in 1918 when the husband was living. He died seven years ago, and since that time the widow has been largely dependent on the small amount of interest returned by the securities.

LOANS TO BROKERS SHOW AN INCREASE

Washington, July 6 (AP)—Loans on stocks and bonds to brokers and dealers by reporting federal reserve members in the New York district increased \$94,000,000 during the week ended July 5 to a total of \$885,000,000, the reserve board reported today.

This compared with \$764,000,000 last week and with \$333,000,000 a year ago.
