

SUMMER BIBLE INSTITUTE WILL BE AT COLTON

Monmouth—The retirement of O. A. Wolverson, Monmouth's postmaster, was the occasion for a social function Thursday evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Phillip Schweizer. Complimenting Wolverson were Mr. and Mrs. James Tilton, Mrs. Wolverson, Miss Mildred Bossett of Independence, Harry Kester and the hosts, Mr. and Mrs. Schweizer.

Wolverson has been postmaster in Monmouth, in all, 19 years. He first served under the Theodore Roosevelt and Taft administrations and for some months under Wilson pending expiration of an appointed second term. He was again appointed during Harding's administration and has served as postmaster here under the administration of seven presidents. He is a native Oregonian, having been born in Polk county, May 10, 1861, on his father's homestead south of Monmouth. He was the first to introduce registered Jersey dairy cattle into this section. He has served as Monmouth's mayor and has held a place on the local school board. Two of his brothers were the late Charles E. Wolverson, federal judge, and the late Rev. Bruce Wolverson, both of Portland.
