

DUCKS BACK IN RUNNING, BEAT SEATTLE TWICE

The whims of the rain gods have helped to return Portland to a threatening position in the Coast league pennant race, a bare two points behind Los Angeles and three games back of the first place Sacramento Senators.

Doubling up this week against Seattle to make up for early season postponements, the Beavers have played three extra games and now hold a 5-1 advantage in the series. The seventh game Indians, handicapped by a small mound staff, took another double trimming from the champions last night, 4-1 and 7-6.

Turpin appeared in the Portland box for the first time this season in the opener and stopped the Indians with 6 hits. Fred Berger, Beaver outfielder, provided the winning punch in the 7-inning nightcap, driving in 4 runs with a homer and two singles.

Joe Demaggio hit safely in his 41st consecutive game as his San Francisco teammates pointed out a 13-5 victory over Hollywood to even the series. The 18-year old rookie whacked a single and double. Playing third base in place of Leo Ostensberg who has a sore arm. Manager Jimmy Caveney had a field day, driving in 4 runs with a double and brace of singles.

VINES DEFEATED BY AUSTRALIAN

Wimbledon, England, July 7 (AP)—Jack Crawford, Australian star, won the final round of the men's singles and with it the Wimbledon championship from Ellsworth Vines today, 4-6, 11-9, 6-2, 2-6, 6-4.

The Australian became, temporarily at least, king of the tennis world as he added the prized Wimbledon title to that of his native land and of France.

His bitter five set victory over Vines, who won the title last year, follows by only a few weeks a straight set victory over Henri Cochet, once great ace of France, in the finals of the French championships.

It was the eighth meeting between the new and the old titleholders of Wimbledon with Crawford victor now in three matches to five for the American champion.

WOOD WITH 292 LEADING FIELD BRITISH OPEN

St. Andrews, Scotland, July 7 (AP)—Craig Wood, big blond American sharpshooter from Deal, N. J., took the lead for the British open golf championship today with a total of 292 for the 72 holes.

Wood shot successive rounds of 68 and 75 to gain a one stroke margin over the defending champion, Gene Sarazen and another American, Leo Diegel, each with 293.

On the same 14th hole that proved disastrous for Walter Hagen in the third round, Gene Sarazen apparently killed all hope of retaining the British open golf championship this afternoon by taking an eight

on his fourth and final round. Until he met this withering blow, Sarazen had made a great fight to overhaul two Americans and three Britons who were tied at 54 holes for the lead with 216 strokes each. The quintet consisted of Leo Diegel, Joe Kirkwood, Henry Cotton, Abe Mitchell and Syd Easterbrook.

Diegel, out in 36, even par on his last round, was setting the pace. Hagen had taken a seven on the 14th in the morning and posted 219 for 54 holes.

Sarazen finished his fourth round with a 75 for a total of 293. This was 10 strokes back of his record score in winning the 1932 British open to a flock of closing attacks.

The first game between the two clubs will be played at Woodburn next Sunday afternoon. The second will be played at Hillsboro, while a third, if necessary, will take place

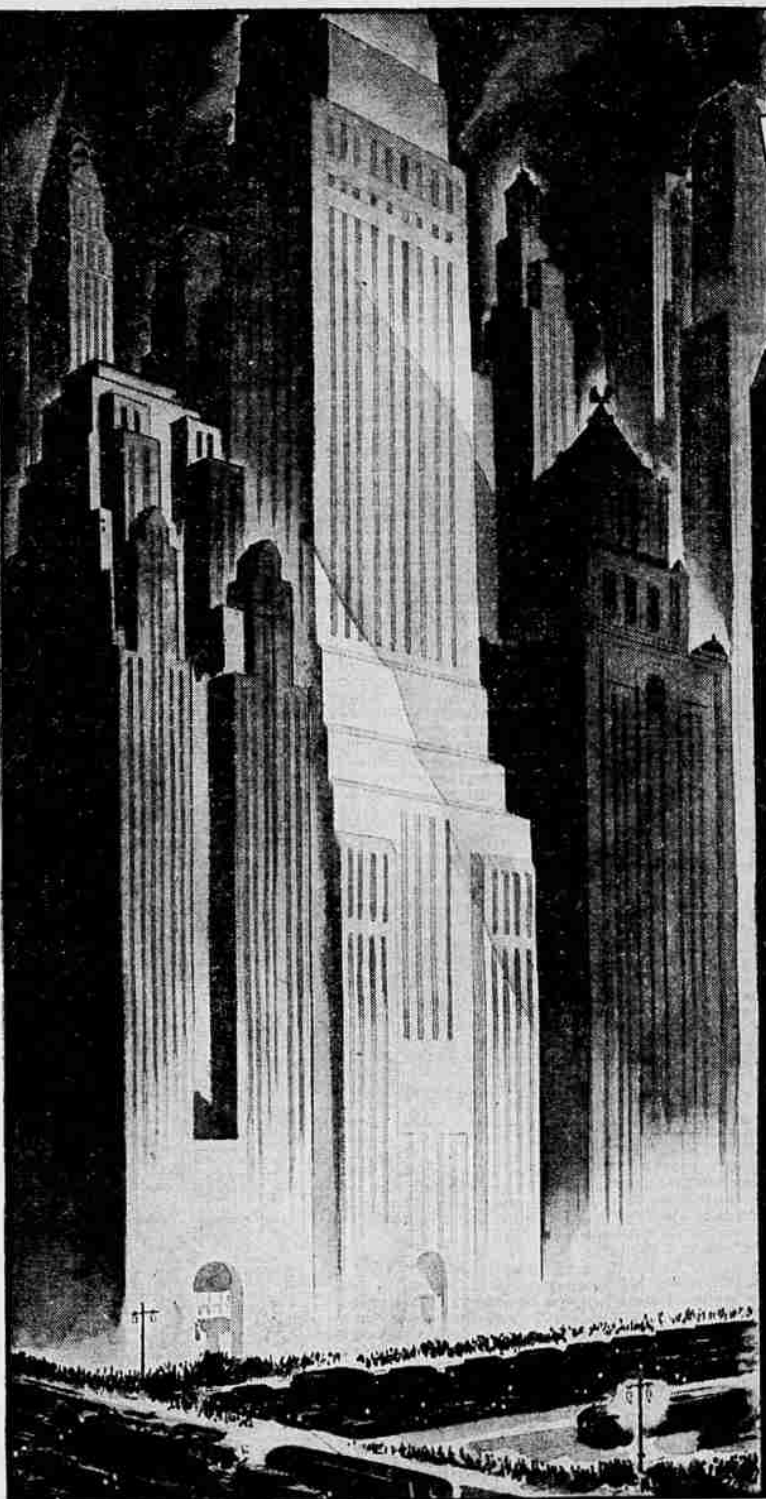
