RECOVERY DRIVE TO BE LAUNCHED

(Copyright, 1933, by United Press) Washington, July 7 (AP)—The government is launching a campaign for public cooperation to assure the success of the national recovery program that is patterned after the war time Liberty loan drives, the United Press learned today. The campaign will be part of the fight against influences threatening to lessen the program's effectiveness.

The drive will be directed by Charles Francis Hornor of Kansas City, the man who sent "four-minute" speakers into every crossroads hamlet in the intensive propaganda campaigns of war days.

Hornor, tall and stern of feature, was discovered by the United Press soon after he began work in a little office in the department of commerce.

He had under way a variety of projects for posters, displays which can be used by employers who raise wages and shorten working hours, and for speakers who will spread the message of industrial salvation throughout the length and breadth of the land.

One of the early features of the campaign will be a speech by President Roosevelt appealing to the nation.

POSTAL SAVINGS GAINS SHOWED

Washington, July 7 (AP)—Indications of returning confidence in the nation's banks was noted today in figures showing a decline in the rush for postal saving depositories.

The banking crisis swelled the total of postal savings deposits to \$1,111,575,385 at the end of March, an increase of \$108,002,815 over February.

Then came swift efforts to re-open closed banks and rehabilitate the general banking structure. By the end of May the rate of increase in postal savings had dropped sharply.

The total on deposit April 30 was \$1,157,651,788, an increase over March of \$46,076,403. May 31 the total was \$1,178,342,117, an increase over April of \$20,690,329.

Postal officials believe the June total will show an even greater rate of decline.

Postal savings have increased tremendously during the depression. At the end of the 1932 fiscal year the balance to the credit of depositors was \$175,271,368; at the end of 1931, \$194,755,742; at the end of 1932, \$789,820,623.

Under the Glass-Steagall banking law enacted by the last congress postal savings are made time instead of demand deposits, thus making it necessary for depositors to give 60 days notice for withdrawals under penalty of forfeiting their interest.

BRIDGE PLANS GET COAST SUPPORT

Marshfield, Ore., July 7 (AP)—Unqualified support for the specifications of Oregon highway engineers for five coast highway bridges, was assured by Edward W. Miller, secretary of the Oregon Coast Highway association in a letter to the state highway commission, he said today.

He said his letter was suggested by recent opposition to the bridge plans which he understands originated with wood interests at St. Helens.

The letter declared the highway organization's principal aim was construction of bridges and he expressed faith in the engineers' specifications which have caused some objection because of the inclusion of steel and cement materials instead of wood. Miller pointed out that considerable timber already is called for in the original plans. He expressed fear further agitation might endanger the entire program.

TEACHERS ADOPT NATIONAL POLICIES

Chicago, July 7 (AP)—The teachers of America met today to approve a creed of national policies.

At the final session of the national education association presented for approval the report of the resolutions committee urging a more equitable system of taxation, removal of schools from politics and a report of the national council of education.

Miss Jessie Gray, Philadelphia, was elected president of the association, defeating Miss Ann Laura Fitch of Denver, Joseph Fowler, retiring vice president, automatically became first vice president.

State bar examinations will be held in the city here today and tomorrow, at the capital Tuesday and Wednesday of next week. The examinations, given by the state board of bar examiners, will be in writing. There are 80 applicants, including six women.

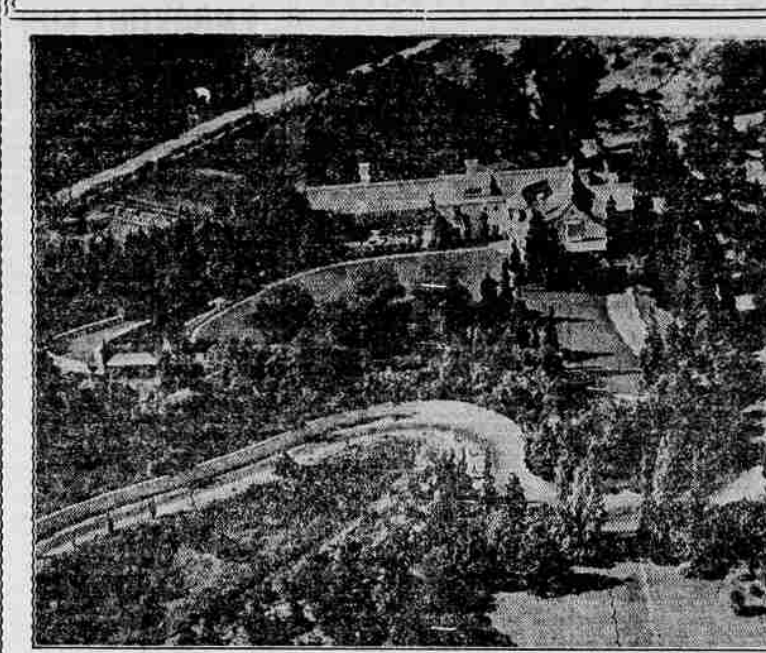
Jefferson county today paid \$3,405.35 to the state treasury. This is half of the first half property tax due the state. Jefferson was the last county which had made no payment.

Mrs. Cheesman was a 14-year-old son by a previous marriage. She claims she is the only woman in the world who has a full master's sailing license.

PORTLAND WHEAT FOR GULF PORTS

Portland, Ore., July 7 (AP)—The Pacific Continental grain corporation announced today it has closed options on two freighters to take full cargoes of wheat from Portland to New Orleans. Shippers said it was the first time in Pacific shipping history that ships have been chartered to take full cargoes of wheat from this coast to gulf ports.

Options were obtained on the Mary D. and Plov City. The Mary D. is one of the few American tramp steamers and has a capacity of 7,000 tons. The Plov City's capacity is 5,000 tons.

The continental company revealed its plans to discharge the ships at New Orleans, distributing to millers in the Mississippi valley, and loading them back for the Pacific coast with corn. The ships were taken on a time-charter basis, calling for successive trips.

RICHARD DIX AND WIFE TO SEPARATE

Hollywood, Cal., July 7 (AP)—Richard Dix, motion picture star, and his wife, the former Winifred Ode of San Francisco, and Portland, Ore., separated, Dix admitted today.

The separation, however, does not necessarily indicate that a divorce is contemplated, Dix made plain.

"Winifred is the sweetest girl in the world," the actor declared. "She will make some other man a splendid wife, but she and I don't speak the same language."

"She is not interested in motion pictures, while I take the social life she enjoys. She deserves only happiness and I hope that she will find the contentment that I did not seem able to give her."

New York, July 7 (AP)—The value of the United States dollar today in gold parity terms of the French franc, was approximately 70 cents. One month ago the dollar was similarly valued at 82 cents while yesterday's figure was 72.3 cents.

FARMERS PLOW ENDS AIR RACES

Los Angeles, July 7 (AP)—The national air races of 1933 were closed officially today, terminated by a farmer's plow.

Plowing an adjacent patch of beans, the farmer uprooted part of the electrical timing system at municipal airport, forcing the abandonment of the scheduled straightaway speed dash for women pilots.

Decided as a result on the basis of the aerial trophy race of Tuesday, the winners were named as follows: First, Mrs. May Haldip, St. Louis, prize \$673; second, Mrs. Martin Bowman, Los Angeles, \$275; third, Mrs. Gladys O'Donnell, Long Beach, Calif., \$225; fourth, Miss Henrietta Sumner, Los Angeles, \$150; Jimmy Wedell, Patterson, La., designer and pilot, was clocked at an average straightaway speed of 278 miles an hour to win second place in the men's straightaway dash. Lieut. Col. Roscoe Turner of Los Angeles having taken first place money with an average of 264 miles an hour. Wedell won \$625. Third place went to Les Gehlbach of Detroit, with 268 miles an hour, prize money \$375. In previous trials Roy Hunsor of Los Angeles averaged 241 miles an hour for fourth place, and Ray Moore, of Alameda, Calif., 231 miles an hour for fifth.

HOGATES CLEARED IN ASSAULT CASE

A large part of the town of Brooks crowded into justice court and blocked the stairways here today to listen to the jury trial of Stanley and Manuel Hogate, charged with assault and battery on the person of Ralph Clark. The verdict of the five-man jury, after deliberating the better part of two hours, and recessing over the noon hour, was that the Hogate boys were not guilty. A separate verdict was brought for each.

The trouble between the Hogates and the Clarks developed after a school party at the Knapwold home. Clark and Manuel Hogate got into an altercation in which fists and teeth were used, and while the fight was going on testimony was that Mrs. Clark, mother of Ralph, entered into the ruckus and wielded one of her shoes on the head of Hogate. He said it caused him, Stanley Hogate's part in the fight appeared to be mainly that of a coacher from the sidelines.

Manuel said he used his teeth on one of Clark's fingers when Clark rammed the digit into his mouth.

The sentiment at Brooks was pretty well divided over the affair.

CORVALLIS SEEKS HIGH SCHOOL LOAN

Corvallis, July 7 (AP)—A \$300,000 grant and loan for construction of a new high school here will be sought from the federal public works fund. The Corvallis school board decided Thursday to make the request.

The board bought a site several years ago and planned to build in 1934 but the depression caused abandonment of the project. A 30 per cent donation from the government led the board to revive its plans. A special election will be held July 11 to pass on the bond issue for the other 70 percent.
