Cherries Picked In Orchards of Polk

Independence—Cherry picking has begun in two local orchards, following closely the holiday of the Fourth, on the D. P. McCarthy and C. A. McLaughlin ranches. The cherries are being shipped to Salem by truck. The McLaughlin orchard tract now operated by Louis Lockwood of Salem, will produce about 60 tons and these will be distributed to Hunt's, Reid-Murdoch, and Paulus canneries in Salem.

The orchard has come through this strange summer weather in fine condition and the crop is far above the average yield for the years past. There is a dearth of pickers, but preference is being given to local people. This affords labor for a considerable number at this season of year when there would be little to do otherwise.

FRISCO BRIDGE BUILDING BEGINS

San Francisco, July 7 (P)—Construction of the \$75,000,000 San Francisco-Oakland bay bridge will be officially launched tomorrow at ground-breaking ceremonies on Yerba Buena island, midway in the bay.

In Washington, President Roosevelt will press a button, setting off the first blast of dynamite. Former President Herbert Hoover has been invited to attend the island ceremonies, at which Governor James Rolph, Jr., of California will be the principal speaker, and turn in the first spadeful of earth.

The bridge, for which \$36,000,000 on contracts have already been let, will link the cities of San Francisco and Oakland, now connected directly only by ferry boat service.

It is the second great bridge project to get under way in the bay region this year. The Golden Gate bridge which will cross the entrance to San Francisco harbor, making a connection with northern counties, was started several months ago.

The bay bridge which will extend in spans from Yerba Buena island to each shore is being financed by the federal reconstruction finance corporation, through purchase of bonds as a self-liquidating project. Much Oregon lumber will be used in the construction of the bridge.

40 ET 8 WRECK AT ILLAHEE CLUB

A class of 25, with 15 from Salem and 10 from Portland, will be initiated into the 40 et 8 society of the American Legion by a degree team known as a "wrecking crew," from Portland vulture No. 25 at the Illahee Country club tonight.

Chief de Gare George Sammis, of Portland, will have charge of the ritualistic work, with Grand Chief de Gare Ed Bayless, of Sheridan, and Grand Correspondent George Burton, of Portland, in charge of the reinstatement of the Marion county vulture.

Dr. B. F. Pound will be installed as chief de Gare of the locals, with Dr. Laban Stevens as correspondent. Other vulture officers will be chosen at the meeting and will probably be given to Silverton and Woodburn men. Jack Eakin, state commander of the American Legion, is heading a delegation from Dallas and Polk county with Yahmili, Tillamook, Benton and Linn counties to be represented.

Heading the list of candidates for initiation, known as "goats" until they become voyageurs, are Allan Carson, commander of Capital Post No. 9; William Bliven, post adjutant; H. R. (Rufe) White, post vice commander; Herman Brown, L. B. (Ted) Endicott, Major Elmer V. Whooten, Tom Hill, manager of the drum corps; Dr. Warden E. Hockett, Worthington C. Smith, Samuel W. Elmore, Walter Zosel, Left Bergavik, C. J. Ward, Curtis Johnson and Iri McSherry.

The business meeting will start at 7:30 o'clock, followed by the ritualistic and initiatory work with the evening to be concluded by a banquet and entertainment. Tom Collins, correspondent for the Portland vulture, comprised the advance guard with a truckload of equipment for the initiation. He reports a large crowd coming from Portland.

CAR LOADINGS FOR WEEK SHOW INCREASE

Washington, July 8 (P)—The American Railway association announced today that car loadings of revenue freight for the week ended July 1 were 934,974 cars, an increase of 29,406 over the preceding week and 145,793 over 1932.

For the first time since car loadings began to climb upward, less than car lot merchandise showed an increase over the preceding week and corresponding week last year.

The showing of less than car lot merchandise was interpreted here as one of the most favorable indications yet shown by car loadings. This type of freight consists of small shipments made from distributing houses in all parts of the country to small merchants.

Railroad men say the increase indicated a wider distribution of goods than heretofore.

NEW HEAT WAVE BURNS GRAIN FIELDS

Winnipeg, July 8 (P)—Blazing sun and cloudless skies today spelled new anxiety for western farmers as they watched their maturing fields of grain. Advance across the prairie provinces of another heat wave menaced conditions of crops and continued lack of rain threatened serious damage.

Temperatures registered in the 80s and 90s in Manitoba, Alberta and Saskatchewan and decidedly warm weather was forecast. Presence of another searing hot spell without additional moisture was regarded as serious by crop experts.

Battleford, Sask., chalked up a 90 mark, while Saskatoon had 89 and Calgary, Lethbridge and Medicine Hat, Alberta, 88. Eastern Saskatchewan was not so hot, with 78 the high in Regina. Winnipeg's top was 82.

democratic party adopted last year should be carried out insofar as it lies in our power. The special session of the congress has already translated into law a great majority of the pledges made.

"One of the pledges of the platform read as follows: 'We advocate repeal of the 18th amendment. To effect such repeal we demand that congress immediately propose a constitutional amendment to truly representative conventions in the states called to act solely on that proposal.'"

"The congress has acted on this and many of the states are now engaged in holding elections for the conventions proposed."

"Finally, I have made it clear ever since my nomination a year ago that I subscribe to the democratic platform 100 per cent. 'In view of the fact that I have had so great a number of telegrams similar to yours not only from your state but from Tennessee, Arkansas, Kentucky and others, I am taking the liberty of giving this message to you to the press. 'Sincerely, 'Franklin D. Roosevelt.'"

CONCORDAT OF HOLY SEE WITH HITLER SIGNED

Vatican City, July 8 (P)—A concordat between the Holy See and Germany was initiated this evening by Cardinal Pacelli, papal secretary of state, and Vice-Chancellor Franz Von Papen of the reich.

The accord is designed to regulate all the questions arising in the supervision of church organizations in Germany and to prevent conflict between the two governments.

Von Papen has been in Rome more than a week negotiating the agreement for which the preliminary discussions were started at his earlier visit here in April.

The concordat, consisting of 35 articles, combines in one treaty all the rights guaranteed to Catholics by existing accords with Prussia, Baden and Bavaria. It does not eliminate the lesser concordats juridically, although such is their practical effect.

Two million Catholics who are not named in the three state concordats are included in the new one which embraces Wuertemberg, Hesse, and Palatinate Anhalt and Saxony. The most important points are: first, the church agrees to keep its priests and religious associations out of politics; second, the state agrees to the continuance of Catholic religious associations, whether clerical or lay, provided they be confined to religious activities.

The concordat provides that Protestant or Catholic instruction shall be compulsory according to the faith of the majority of pupils in a school district. The minority shall receive instruction apart in their own faith.

GIRL TRADED FOR MULE DIES IN KENTUCKY

Hopkinsville, Ky., July 8 (P)—Death has written the final chapter in the life of Louise Gibbs Green, who at 13 was given in marriage for a mule team and whose leg was shot off last October by a spurned lover.

The young woman, only 18, died last night at the home of relatives here.

After she married Ed Green five years ago she ran away and left him. Her father and legal action between members of the Green family and her followed and county authorities reported both the girl and her father, Henry Gibbs, said Gibbs had been given two mules and a wagon by Green in exchange for permission for him to marry her.

Last October 16 William Perrigo, who wanted to marry her, shot her leg off. He later offered again to marry her, but she refused.

STUDY LINN PLAN ON HIGHWAY WORK

With improvements of the North Santiam highway between Mill City and Gates as a secondary highway in the offering for this summer, County Engineer Swart has suggested to the county court a visit to Linn county to see the plan which has been adopted on relief work on the South Santiam in that county. The county on that work has maintained its own bunkhouses and commissary and the plan, the county engineer states, has worked out very successfully. Under this plan with the road work a considerable distance away from the center of labor, the necessity of trucking the men back and forth is done away with and considerable overhead expense obviated.

Swart stated that he expects work will start on the secondary highway improvement between Mill City and Niagara as soon as money is available. An allotment of \$50,000 was made for that purpose. The distance between the two points is 7.2 miles and the road will be a part of the North Santiam highway when completed.

COTTON GROWERS SIGN

Washington, July 8 (P)—Secretary Wallace said today that growers in 14 of the 16 cotton producing states have offered to take 5,566,169 acres out of production in return for government cash and option benefits.

REPEALISTS TO CARRY BATTLE TO COUNTRYSIDE

Leaders directing the campaign of the Oregon division of the women's organization for national prohibition reform to place Oregon in the parade of states ratifying repeal of the 18th amendment will carry their fight directly to the voters throughout the state during the two weeks remaining before the special election of July 21. It is announced by Mrs. David Honeyman of Portland, state chairman.

A "motorcade," scheduled to visit 24 cities and towns, will carry the arguments of the women repealists to the people and impress upon the voters the necessity of getting the vote out for the special election at which delegates to the state constitutional convention will be elected and instructed.

Oregon will ratify repeal of the 18th amendment if the full repealist strength is voted," says Mrs. Honeyman, who is being assisted in direction of the Oregon campaign by Miss Lillian C. Harris of New York, representative of the national council of the organization.

Salem will be the location of the final wind-up meeting of the "motorcade" at 8 o'clock on the evening of July 18. All of the meetings will be held in the open air.

McMinnville will be host to the touring campaigners at 3 o'clock next Monday, July 10, and meetings will be held at Independence at 9 p. m., and at Dallas at 8 p. m., the same day.

Friday, July 14, will be devoted to a trip through the central Willamette valley with meetings at 11:30 a. m. at Canby; 12:30 p. m. at Aurora; 1:15 p. m. at Hubbard; 2 o'clock at Woodburn; 3:15 p. m. at Silverton; 4:30 p. m. at Sublimity; 5:15 p. m. at Turner, and 8 o'clock at Newberg.

The "motorcade" will be in Albany for a street meeting at noon Monday, July 17.

COST \$2200 TO OPEN M'KENZIE HIGHWAY

Bend, Ore., July 8 (P)—The cost of opening McKenzie pass this year was approximately \$2200, according to tentative figures obtained today from the highway office. The bill for dynamite alone was \$448. Last year the mountain road was cleared at a cost of \$1165 but there was comparatively little snow on McKenzie summit in the late spring of 1932.

This year the state crew operated, started work on the highway June 21. The final snow barrier was penetrated June 27.
