

RURAL SCHOOL LEADERS MEET ON CONTRACTS

Dallas—The board of directors for the non-high school districts of the county composed of W. Frank Crawford, A. R. Cadle, George Stewart, L. N. Lindeman and Jesse V. Johnson, met Friday night in the courthouse and completed a six hour session before they adjourned.

High school boards from this and adjacent counties were on hand 100 per cent and before the evening was over contracts for the tuition of high school students from the non-high school districts had been made with Salem, Dallas, Independence, Monmouth, Falls City, Rickreall, Perrydale, Bethel, Airle, Willamina, Sheridan, and Corvallis. These contracts provide for the payment to the high school districts of the exact cost of education of each student by the non-high school districts as provided in the plan of the state board of education.

A discussion of transportation routes followed the making of the tuition contracts and the representatives of the schools all expressed their views.

The open meeting adjourned at this point and the board went into a conference regarding the said routes and after considerable debating adopted them as they were in the county in 1932 and 1933.

OPINION DIVIDED AS TO BUS ROUTE

Monmouth—The Polk county non-high school district board organized last week by electing W. P. Crawford of the West Salem district, chairman. The board is now at work arranging for bus transportation for high school students.

Of particular interest in Monmouth is the reported aim to raid Monmouth territory to make up a bus line for the Dallas high school. This is the bus that has been starting at Lewisville. There is a considerable part of this line which naturally leans toward Dallas, being in the Dallas tract district and directly south of that city. To piece out the route the proposal is made to make a loop from Lewisville, following the Elkins road to the vicinity of the Lacklume and turning west again. This part of the line is served by the district school bus to Monmouth where the grade school children finish the eighth grade they naturally will want to continue in the Monmouth high school. If the high school route is established as planned they will have to go to Dallas to high school. There is considerable difference of opinion in connection with this proposed addition to the Dallas bus route.

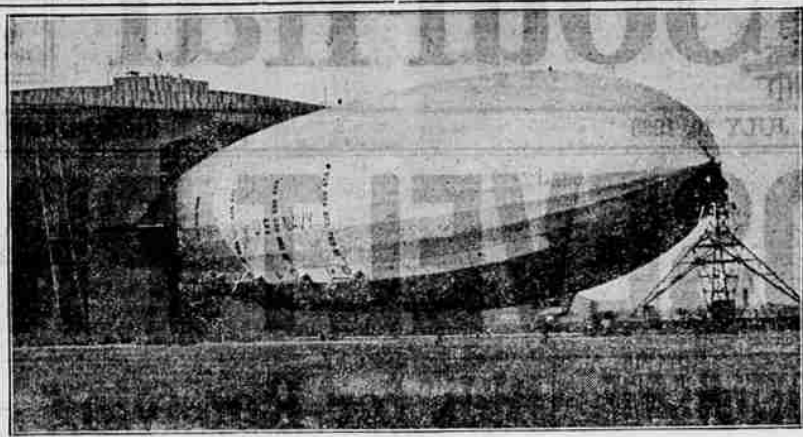
VACATION IS OVER

IDLE MILL TO RESUME WORK

AUTO TURNOVER INJURES FOUR

Independence—Four men were seriously injured in an automobile accident on the Fourth when their car left the road rounding a curve near the Buena Vista-Independence road, and rolled over into the ditch. A passing motorist gathered up the injured men and brought them to Independence for medical attention.

Of the four men, one whose name was not given, suffered a fracture of the leg near the hip, and after receiving a temporary splint at the hands of a local physician was sent to Salem for further attention. Bill Barbanoff, another occupant, sustained two broken ribs, his brother Fred received a bad laceration on the neck at the base of the skull, and the fourth man in the crash, Paul Maklakoff, suffered a shoulder injury. Aside from these injuries of a comparatively serious nature all suffered more or less minor bruises and scratches.

The car, which was headed toward Independence, upon coming to the turn at the beginning of the straight mile stretch several miles out of Buena Vista, left the road on the curve, became unmanageable, skidded in soft dirt and gravel for a short distance and rolled over into a deep ditch, pinning the occupants underneath.

This was the most serious accident reported from this vicinity during the holiday period.

GRAVE RECORDS ARE COMPILED BY CARETAKER

Dallas—Clarence T. Smith, superintendent of the L.O.O.F. and city cemeteries for the past three and a half years, is devoting his spare time to the compilation of a complete record of the graves in both places.

According to Smith there are approximately 2500 graves, of which number over 800 are unmarked. While the superintendent admits it is a big job and will take quite a lot of time, he is relying on assistance from those who have plots and who are well acquainted with the old established families and also with those who have moved away for some reason or other.

Much valuable aid in this direction is being given by Frank Goad, Joe Siberly and Horatio Morrison to mention just a few of the old timers. Not every one in the community knows that the new section is endowed and that the trust fund, which amounts to approximately \$2500, is handled by the Laid & Bush Trust company in Salem. Every dollar goes into this trust fund. One of the permanent improvements effected since Smith took charge was the laying of an eight-inch tile at a depth of five and a half feet, in the new section. Other improvements are being planned for the future whenever funds are available.

When completed the record will form a more or less historical record, in fact, Smith plans to make a separate one, of all veterans of the various wars. The old section is the resting place of at least one Indian war veteran. His name is Ezekiel Kennedy, and when matters are straightened out the graves of others may be discovered.

Permanent markers of concrete or of any other selected material will be installed by Smith at a very reasonable charge when directed to do so. Any assistance which any person can render to make this record and survey authentic will be greatly appreciated.

SILVERTON GRANGE OPPOSES SALES TAX

Silverton—Giving definite reasons for their decision, the Silverton grange legislative committee has gone on record against the sales tax, the referendum on the grange power bill, as well as the desire to see the defeat of the constitutional amendment concerning bond issues. The committee deems the sales tax an unfair charge upon the people, feeling the "tax should be levied on the ability to pay." Concerning the power bill the committee states that its only objective is low priced power, which would provide for greater industrial development of the state, and they feel that the state should cooperate with such as the Columbia river power development project. They believe that the bond issue, if not defeated, would allow a minority of one-third to frustrate the will and purpose of the majority.
