OLD HOSE CART NOW ON SHELF

Stayton—Following a short regular monthly meeting of the Stayton fire department the members of the company devoted the balance of the evening in testing out the new equipment recently added to the fire department.

The department purchased a four-wheel trailer, on which they mounted the various lines of hose, replacing the antiquated high wheel cart. The entire outfit cost around \$75 and will add materially towards the already standard equipment of the department to afford better and quicker service to fires. Various business men of town donated their time and labor in giving Stayton this added equipment, which included Joseph Fisher, labor; E. W. Lau, painting; George Schiller, welding; J. H. Miesler, labor; Jacob Spaniol, plunger; Murphy Gardner, lumber company; Stayton Hardware company, materials and O. M. Baker, labor. The committee of the fire department in charge of securing this equipment was E. C. Downing, O. M. Baker and H. J. Rowe.

The first test was made on main street in Stayton where the trailer which is neatly painted in fire department colors, was attached to the rear of a car and at regular drill the hose was attached to the hydrant and taken to the destination of the fire in less than half the time under the old system. The department plans in the future to add further improved equipment to its already up-to-date plant.

Clear Lake Fruit Prospects Varied
