

SEWAGE PLANT DRIVE OPENED AT SILVERTON

Silverton—The different organizations of town have appointed a general committee to set in an educational campaign in respect to the vote on the bond issue that will appear on the July 21 ballot. The members include Roy Davenport, chairman, Dr. P. A. Loe, Ernest Starr, James Scott, Orl Schlader, Henry Alm and Clara Jarvis.

The committee personnel met Tuesday forenoon and formulated tentative plans on the way to get the explanations properly before the voters. The chairman has announced that he wishes it generally understood and emphasized that the upkeep in interest on the issue is not a tax on property, but on the plant itself as a liquidation, and no "come back" on the property owner is possible on the part of the government for the loan. The lien is on the sewage disposal plant only. Authoritative figures disclose the 4.2 percent interest will take care of the liquidation. That the plant has to pay its own way must be assured before the loan can be secured from the reconstruction corporation.

The committee members advise that Portland has practically assured the other towns of the valley that its sewage disposal plant will be established and this will undoubtedly force the work and compel it to be done later under far less favorable circumstances for the procuring of the loans, than can be arranged now as no one has a legal right to polite streams.

As the affair now stands, in brief, the plant would cost about \$35,000. Thirty percent of this is offered free by the government and a 3 1/2 percent interest rate on the balance. The remaining 7 percent making up the stated 4.2 percent, is the cost of connections and operations.

The committee warns that the sewage disposal plant will eventually have to be built, and the government offer is only in effect for a limited time. They will announce definite plans for a mass meeting and talks on instructions, later.

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SILVERTON TO TAKE PART IN PARK CEREMONY

Silverton—As a result of the conference of the board of directors of the chamber of commerce and of the Salem Kiwanis club at a banquet here Monday, plans for the program of dedicating the Silver Falls state park July 23 were discussed.

Alf O. Nelson, chairman of the chamber of commerce committee, will make plans for the Silverton band and the local men are to prepare a stage and other necessities for the ground arrangements.

Members of the Kiwanis club have issued an attractive pamphlet showing a cut of the north falls, height 146 feet, with the general invitation checked in red. This reads, "You are invited to attend the dedication and picnic at the Silver Falls State Park, Sunday afternoon, July 23. Music and bands, free coffee and no charge anywhere."

A short program will be in order with mayors of cities of the state telling of "What my city has to offer the tourist." Leslie M. Scott, chairman of the state highway commission, will be the principal speaker of the afternoon.

Special guides will conduct visitors to the various waterfalls which lie in a radius of four and a half miles through wooded canyons and overhanging cliffs. The nine falls that may be seen are North falls, 146 feet; south 134 feet; lower, 100 feet; middle north 116 feet; double falls, 189 feet; Drake, 27 feet; twin, 25 feet; lower north 35 feet; and Winter falls, 198 feet.

Trails lead behind, underneath and over several of the falls and one may follow an easy mountain trail constructed by the state highway department.

A directive map showing the loop highway from Salem out through Macleay and Shaw and completing the loop by way of Silverton, gives the visitor a sure route. The roads are in the finishing stage on the last lap of the loop on the south end, and will be in order by the 23rd. The loop trip is 57 miles long and runs through ideal scenery including beautiful falls and the ruggedness of mountains.
