

STEIWER AND M'NARY SPEAK TO ROOSEVELT

Washington, July 13 (AP)—Senator Republican Leader McNary and Senator Steiwer, Rep., Ore., yesterday at the White House urged President Roosevelt to give consideration to Oregon projects in general in approving public works to be constructed with emergency funds voted at the last session of congress.

McNary said they also discussed with the president extension of the vocational training now afforded Indians at the Chemawa Indian school, Salem, Ore. Mr. Roosevelt suggested they confer with the commissioner of Indian Affairs.

Steiwer presented to the president arguments against abolition or major curtailment in the agricultural market news service provided by the agricultural department. Mr. Roosevelt said he had been discussing the matter with Secretary of Agriculture Wallace.

HEAD HUNTERS' LEGEND IS TOLD

Berkeley, Cal. (AP)—The story of the head hunting Indians of Ecuador was told here recently by Dr. Matthew W. Stirling, explorer and chief of the Bureau of American Ethnology of the Smithsonian Institution, who just returned from Peru.

In the beginning there were in the world only Kimpango, the Creator; Chingaso, his wife, and their son, Esta, the sun.

Out of mud, Kimpango created Nantu, the moon, as a wife for Esta, but she was shy and kept away from him.

The nightbird, Aulu, fell in love with Nantu, but she repulsed him also, and one night disappeared far into the sky.

Aulu, however, went in pursuit and tried to climb a trailing vine to the moon. But Nantu cut the vine, which fell and became entangled among the trees where it still remains.

The eclipse of the moon occurs when Esta strikes Nantu. When Nantu is the aggressor, that is the moon eclipsing the sun. And when Nantu weeps, there is rain.

These two persons were the parents of the head hunters' tribe, according to their legends.

VISION GOTTEN BY STEREOSCOPE

Rochester, N. Y. (AP)—While the normal infant is born possessing the faculty of distinguishing light from darkness and, possibly, with the sense of color, it certainly is not born with the faculty of stereoscopic vision, according to Wilbur B. Rayton, optical scientist.

This latter faculty, Rayton declared, whereby the person of normal vision is able to distinguish objects in their proper perspective and in their physical relationship to one another, is an acquired characteristic that has to be learned, just as the infant later learns to walk. This, the last characteristic of vision to be acquired in infancy, also is the easiest to lose after it has been acquired, as the result of disease, accident, or uncorrected refractive errors of the eyes.

In explaining the mechanics of stereoscopic vision as performed by the eye, Rayton said:

"Normally we receive an impression of an object through each eye, but the brain is able to combine these two impressions in such a manner that we are conscious only of one, and we see, therefore, but a single object. This ability is called the fusion faculty. By means of it we are able to recognize, without conscious effort, whether an object is in front of or back of another, and whether it is flat or has the dimensions of a solid object. In general, stereoscopic vision is effective for distances up to 450 yards."

COWBOYS LASSO WANDERING BEAR

Laramie, Wyo. (AP)—A bear that went over the mountain to see what he could see was roped by two Laramie plains cowboys.

Clint and Lou Wallis, regular, hard-riding cow pokes, saw the bear one day while they were riding the range. The animal fell an easy prey to the lariat of one of the Wallis brothers and was taken to Boaler, Wyo., 18 miles north of Laramie.

The bear entertained the natives at Boaler by breaking the lariat and climbing a telephone pole. He finally was recaptured and taken to the Wallis ranch.

Red Cross Workers Brought By Slump

Washington (AP)—The plight of the depression's destitute has aroused more women to volunteer for Red Cross work than the exigency of the world war, according to national headquarters of the organization.

More than 600,000 are engaged in garment making alone. Feminine workers also have taken a large part in relief activities of all kinds. Some of their accomplishments, making 80,000,000 finished garments, 3,810,000 surgical dressings, 33,000 Christmas bags, 128,000 pints of preserves.

Columbia, Pa. (AP)—Farmers of this fertile Susquehanna river valley section have objected to daylight saving time.

That was demonstrated when 97 of them petitioned markets here to switch back to standard time after the clock had been advanced an hour.

The farmers contended the change in time resulted in a decided decrease in sales and proved a "severe hardship" on them besides.

The farmers' request was granted.

FRENCH PLAN ON WINE INVASION

Paris (AP)—The International chamber of commerce has just drafted a preparatory program comprising five resolutions, for the importation of French wines into the United States.

The International exportation commission, which was charged with the program, reported that United States consumers have placed numerous orders for wine here, in most cases sealing the deal with a 20 per cent payment. It is understood also that, despite devaluation of the dollar, the French trade has not been assured customs duties will not be higher than before the war.

The program's resolutions follow:

1. It is necessary to assure the strict protection of wines and spirits against limitation when prohibition eventually is repealed.

2. We hope the customs duties will not be at the pre-war rate and that the question of advantageous tariffs for wine shipped in bottles will be kept in mind by the French government through trade negotiations with the United States.

3. It is necessary to renew the registration of trademarks in the United States, with labels, caps, corks and photographs of the bottle.

4. It is advisable that technicians be sent to the United States to start an educational campaign in favor of wine, as Italy and Germany already have done.

5. Radio broadcasting of wine topics in English is urged.

ITALIAN KING'S HERMIT IS DEAD

Ischia, Italy (AP)—Host to the King of Italy, Fra' Giovanni, 90-year-old hermit of the highest mountain on the island Mount Epomeo, has just died. His choicest recollection included an autographed photograph of the King.

The sovereign made the trip to Mount Epomeo years ago and gladly accepted the hermit's humble cave for shelter when a sun shower surprised the excursionists.

"I gave King Victor Emmanuel III some of my bread," Fra' Giovanni would relate, "and I saw him eat it then and there—with my own eyes."

He was extremely popular to the hundreds of tourists, who flocked to this island during the last 75 years. But above all, Fra' Giovanni really mourned by the native children, who often climbed their way to his mountain haunt.

He had a surprising memory and visitors, if they were lucky, revealed at his tales of bygone days when, in the Old Man's own words: "I was somebody, believe me!"

No one truly managed to learn why Fra' Giovanni ever retired from civilized life. Some said the reason was to be found in a love affair which had gone sour in his allegedly adventurous youth. Others preferred that he was unaccepting of penitence because of a fortune squandered in gambling.

CANADIANS JOIN GIRL GUIDE MOVE

Montreal (AP)—The increasing popularity and rapid growth of the Girl Guide movement in Canada is revealed by reports presented to the annual meeting of the Canadian council of the Girl Guides association.

A report shows that there now are 1,015 Guide companies, 582 Brownie Packs, 95 Ranger companies, seven Sea Ranger companies, 20 Cadet companies, 10 Lone Guide companies, and five Extension Post Guide companies.

The movement is represented in 619 communities—four companies in the Yukon.

The total membership is 41,862. Commissioners in charge of provinces and districts number 206, and secretaries 390.

The Girl Guide movement, the report revealed, is reaching all types of girls, and different races and religions. Over 600 churches of various denominations have Guide companies.

AIDED MINISTER
Boston (AP)—When Father Edward L. Murphy, S.J., said his first mass at Holy Trinity church here recently, a brother, Father George Murphy, S.J., served as deacon, and another brother, Rev. Paul Murphy, S.J., served as sub-deacon.

Wellesley Students To Be Sent To Europe

Wellesley, Mass. (AP)—So they may acquire an international perspective in foreign affairs, Wellesley college will send five of its juniors to Europe for a year's study in foreign capitals next year.

Helen Seathoff of South Orange, N. J., and Miriam Johnson of Woburn, will go to Germany; and A. Villette Sullivan of Washington, D. C., to France; and Mary Stedman of Boston to Spain.

CHILD SURVIVES RIFLE'S BULLET

Alva, Okla. (AP)—The four year old son of a Woods county rancher may go through life carrying a heavy rifle bullet in his brain. Physicians say the chances of living the Biblical allotment of three score and ten years will not be lessened.

A neighbor tried to slaughter a cow, firing from a rifle into the animal's head.

The bullet entered the cow's head, struck a horn, was deflected, passed through a steel plate on a gate and continued its course for 280 feet before striking Verlin Dale Bryson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Bryson.

It passed through his head, a lobe of the brain and lodged just behind the child's right ear. Carried 40 miles by automobile to a hospital here, X-ray pictures revealed that removal of the bullet probably would cause his death.

Specialists advised that the bullet be allowed to remain.



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FRENCHMEN ARE HEALTHIER NOW

Paris (AP)—That the average young Frenchman of today is a better physical specimen than his father at the same age is indicated by army figures, although health experts have voiced a warning against violent sports superinducing cardiac troubles.

The army data, which shows a steady improvement in the young men of recent years, is based on the so-called Figniet Index, to which all army recruits are submitted for examination. This system consists in adding the candidate's weight to the figure of his pectoral circumference and dividing the sum by his height.

When the quotient is below 20, the subject is strong; if between 20 and 30, he is of medium resistance. A result above 30 denotes subnormal physique proportionately as the figure grows.

For the year 1932, according to the military index for the Parisian district, 38.37 percent of the recruits were in the strong class, 45.55 percent in the medium, and only 16.08 were classified as feeble. In 1932 the total average was similar, the figures being: first class, 37.75 percent; middle class, 46.20 percent; weak class, 16.03 percent.

Only five percent of those called for service were turned away under the heading of physical exemption.

HUGE STATUE OF LENIN FOR SOVIET PALACE

Moscow (AP)—The world's largest statue, a gigantic figure of V. I. Lenin, will be placed on top of the newly projected Palace of Soviets to be built on the site of the former Cathedral of the Redeemer.

Where once there glittered a huge gold dome visible from any part of Moscow, will rise a colossal Lenin, very likely in the heroic pose already traditional here—one arm extended over the populace in fervent exhortation.

The official announcement orders a monument from 164 to 246 feet tall. In view of the new Russia's love for the superlative, it may be expected to be closer to the maximum than to the minimum. Its immensity may be gauged by the fact that the ancient Colossus of Rhodes was only about 135 feet and the Statue of Liberty is 150 feet high.

The Palace of Soviets itself, designed by Architect Boris Yofan, will be roughly in the form of a pedestal for this ambitious statue, the whole forming a sensational monument to the idolized leader whose mortal remains lie in Red Square.

Models of the projected palace on view here disclose a victory of classic over modernist or futurist notions. Nearly 300 designs have been studied by Soviet leaders in the last two years, many of them exotically modernistic. In the end, the Kremlin gave its blessing to a design essentially classic and simple in its proportions.

From a vast demonstration square, a 250 foot stairway will lead to the palace, a large circular colonnaded arcade—somewhat reminiscent of St. Peter's in Rome—serving as the main entrance. A series of set-back terraces, large enough for demonstrations by tens of thousands, will lead from one story to the next.



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KODAK HUNTER ON LONG TREK ACROSS NATION

Washington (AP)—A survey of the outdoor assets of America, both along the roadside and in out of the way places, is the purpose of an auto-photographic trip of Arthur Newton Pack, president of the American Nature association.

Noted as a "hunter of wild life with a camera," and active in making a 10,000-mile trip that takes him twice across the continent and to Alaska.

Pack is an active campaigner against the billboard advertising which lines the nation's highways. "As we travel across the continent we are impressed with the extent to which Americans have allowed roadsides to be ruined by unsightly billboards and commercial structures," said Pack. "If the pleasure and safety of travel by automobile are to be preserved, rural billboards must come down."

The main object of Pack's trip will be to photograph wild life and gather material for the official magazine of the association. He also will give particular attention to

problems of wild life conservation, which he describes as a vital issue confronting the entire United States.

"Over great areas our game birds fast are disappearing," he said, "in spite of reduced seasons, trans-planting and importation." Pack favors the formation of militant organizations in each state to combat the evils inherent in the granting of special killing privileges given the hunter.

Pueblo, Colo. (AP)—Because he could not wear any of the clothing contained in a stolen suitcase, Ramon Baros, 28, of Vineland, burned the suitcase and contents after he had stolen it from a parked automobile. He was fined \$50 in police court.

The suitcase was stolen from a car belonging to R. D. Edwards of Norfolk, Va., who was visiting here. The clothing destroyed by the man included a navy officer's uniform.
