What is the standard size of the cup on a golf green? R.S.

A. It is 4 1/4 inches in diameter. The edge of the steel rim must be sunk at least 3/4 of an inch below the surface of the turf.

Q. When are men and women considered bachelors and old maids?—L.S.

A. There is no arbitrary rule. In fact, the term, old maid, is no longer in good usage. By the time a man or woman has entered middle life, that is to say, at about thirty-five years or forty, the terms, bachelor and single woman, begin to be applied.

Q. What are the two bright stars which appear in the east in the evening? L.O.D.

A. The planets Mars and Jupiter are now visible in the eastern sky and are the brightest of stars.

Q. How many men were in winter quarters with Admiral Byrd in the Antarctic? V.V.

A. He took with him 60 men all told, of which 42 wintered in the Antarctic.

Q. Is France still sending convicts to French Guiana? L.P.R.

A. Cayenne, or French Guiana, was a penal colony from its founding on until January 1, 1933. The penal colony was abolished as of that date, and no more convicts will be sent there.

A. The fur of the seal in the rough is heavy and is covered with a thick coat of dark brown guard or water-hairs. When these are plucked

ed out a dense thick woolly underfur is left. This is dyed and the pelt on the skin shaved to reduce the weight. The finished fur is flexible with an excellent depth of color and sheen.

Q. What is the greatest number of shares handled on the New York Stock Exchange in one day? C.B.E.

A. The peak was approximately 16,400,000 shares on October 29, 1929.

Q. Is sherry a light or dark colored wine? M.W.H.

A. Sherry is naturally light colored, darkening with age. There are two main varieties—Amontillado and Manzanilla. The former is made of various degrees of strength and color. Manzanilla is much lighter.

Q. How many policemen are there in the United States? R.K.

A. Counting all types, the census enumerated 131,807 in 1930.

Q. Did Sir Malcolm Campbell coast or brake his car after making his record speed? A. A. H.

A. He did not coast after being clocked, but used his brakes and slowed his car in that manner.

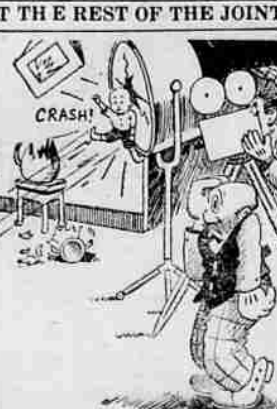
