

PRUNE GROWERS TO TALK PRICES

Portland, July 13 (AP)—The question of federal control of the price of the 1933 prune crop will be discussed by members of the Northwest Dried Fruit association at a meeting here Tuesday, July 18. The meeting was called after representatives met at Roseburg Tuesday with several growers of Douglas county.

Representatives of independent growers and cooperatives throughout Oregon have been invited to attend the meeting next week. The association is composed of 25 packing companies and cooperatives. Packers at Tuesday's meeting in Roseburg agreed that pending the Portland session they will not quote prunes unless the price will net growers six cents a pound.

The association petitioned that George O. Gntlin, cooperative marketing specialist at Oregon State college, be sent at once to Washington, D. C., for a conference with officials in charge of the administration of the agricultural recovery act to determine if federal price control can be established in time to effect the 1933 crop.

SAFETY ACT CAUSE OF CASE'S RETRIAL
