ANNUAL DALLAS FARMERS' EVENT WAITS SATURDAY

Dallas—The stage is all set for the annual Farmers' Day which was scheduled to be held originally on July 1 but was finally held over for two weeks and will now take place Saturday.

The affair will be an all day one and the zero hour will be 10 o'clock, when a program arranged by Mrs. George Van Santen will be given in the city park. In addition to a musical program to which six community clubs will contribute an impromptu baby show promises to be the biggest attraction. It will be divided into two divisions, the first for babies under one year and the second for two to three years old.

Four prizes are being offered in each division, in each case for the youngest baby, the fattest baby, the prettiest girl baby, and the prettiest girl baby. The variety program will include vocal solos, duets, readings, and musical numbers.

All stores will be closed from 1 to 3 o'clock and the day's festivities will be concluded with a street dance in the evening.

A prize of \$10 in cash will be given to the community receiving the most points in the meet while as an inducement to the ladies to take an active part in the athletic program the Mountain States power company will give a waffle iron to the woman who places in the most events.
