

## ALEXANDER TO PITCH AGAINST SALEM'S CLUB

The greatest traveling baseball team in the world will play the Salem Senators here next Tuesday.

The House of David team, always spectacular, have the added attraction of Grover Cleveland Alexander as their starting pitcher against the Senators.

Baseball history fairly reeks with the records Alexander established and the feats he performed. In 1916 he won 33 games and lost 12. Sixteen of those wins were shutouts.

Over a three-year period "Alexander the Great" won 93 games. That was during the time he pitched Philadelphia to the National league championship in 1915.

In preparation for the House of David game, the Salem Senators are right now thinking more about Sunday's state league game here with Albany.

Such hitters as Wilkinson, Downing, McClain and Lamb are constant threats. Manager Bill Wilkinson has a knack of stretching a minimum of hits into a maximum of runs. It was such a performance as this that enabled Albany to hand the Senators their first setback in the state league this season.

Yesterday the Senators and Silverton's town baseball team failed to finish a twilight game which was started. As dusk descended the Senators overtook Silverton's lead and

The Senators nicked Burch for 12 hits in a little over four innings. Tweed got into trouble after making a wild throw to second on a fielded ball. Rex Pemberton took his place in the fourth and was more effective.

## VERGEZ HOMER WRESTS GAME FROM ST. LOUIS

New York, July 14 (AP)—With two strikes against him in the ninth inning, Johnny Vergez landed on one of Tex Carleton's best deliveries and drove the ball into the left field stands for the home run that gave New York a 3 to 2 win over St. Louis.

Chicago extended its winning streak to eight straight by trouncing Brooklyn, 4 to 0, behind Lon Warneke's masterly pitching. Pittsburgh replaced St. Louis at third position by downing Boston, 6 to 3. The Phillies again rose out of the cellar by beating Cincinnati, 4 to 3, sinking the Reds back into the basement, although the Reds outthrew them 11 to 9.

Washington's American league lead over New York was pared to one lone game when the Senators succumbed to Chicago, 9 to 6. The Yankees extended their winning streak to six straight by crushing St. Louis, 12 to 0.

Odel Hale drove out a homer in the eighth with a mate on base to give Cleveland a 6 to 5 win over Philadelphia. Detroit needed out Boston, 3 to 2, when Johnny Stone's double drove in Charley Gehring with the winning run in the eighth.

With the way the first division teams are fighting for the leadership, any one likely to reach the top almost daily. Los Angeles and Hollywood, tied for third place, are three games behind the Sacramento Senators, who have managed to head the league for several weeks.

Two of the teams, however, may slip downward when the top division clubs play each other next week.

## Senator Hitters Lag In Batting Roster Of Oregon State League

Portland, Ore., July 14 (AP)—Dick Bishop, hustling catcher of the Eugene entrant in the league, is leading the regular hitters with a mark of .524, with all teams just past the halfway mark in the league schedule, according to figures released here today. Wilkinson, star left-handed batsman of the Albany team is second with a mark of .462. The averages give Bishop 11 safeties in 21 trips to the plate while Wilkinson smashed out 12 hits in 26 trips.

The hard-hitting Bend Eagles, league leaders, lead in run scoring, the team having attained the high average of eight runs per game for the first eight contests.

## Wrestler Killed In Auto Accident

Hermiston, Ore., July 14 (AP)—Billy Severe, Kansas City heavyweight wrestler, was killed in an automobile accident on the Columbia River highway near here yesterday. Walter Podolak, Syracuse university wrestler and weight lifter, driving the car, was seriously injured.

The two were driving to Portland from Walla Walla, Wash. It is believed Podolak fell asleep at the wheel. At the Hermiston hospital it was learned Podolak will probably recover, but an arm and hand injury may end his career as a wrestler and weight lifter.

## NUMBER WAS UP FOR BIG GREEK

Ettaw, Ala., July 14 (AP)—The death of George Kotsanos, a Prossie automobile accident near here closed a story-book career the Greek wrestler pursued on the theory that "when a man's number is up, it's up."

Educated in Athens, Kotsanos fought in the Balkan war of 1912 against the Turks and saw comrades fall on all sides.

"Don't worry," he would say, "when a man's number is up, it's up."

It wasn't up for Kotsanos in the Balkan war and it wasn't up when he got caught in a street fight in Cairo between Mohammedans and Christians. He was wounded by the Turks but recovered.

In his career in the ring and the movies, Kotsanos had his nose smashed, was in many bad falls and in an airplane crash—but his number wasn't up.

A wrestler couldn't fill a date in Nashville, Tenn., this week and Kotsanos substituted. He was driving to New Orleans with John Paul Jones, Texas wrestler, yesterday.

The car skidded in gravel and overturned. Jones was seriously injured. Kotsanos, who police believe went to sleep at the wheel, was killed. His number was up.

## SEMI-FINALS AT VANCOUVER

Vancouver, B. C., July 14 (AP)—Only once in 38 years has the Canadian amateur golf championship been won by a player from the United States but today it seemed headed for another trip across the border.

As the four survivors entered the semi-finals, Ken Black, 20-year-old son of the Shaughnessy Heights club professional, was the sole remaining Canadian hope.

Black's rival in the semi-finals was Harry Givan of Seattle, former University of Washington freshman, while Frank Delp of Portland and Albert (Scotty) Campbell of Seattle were paired in the other match.

Delp played the best golf of the week when he eliminated Jack Cameron of Toronto, 5 and 4, yesterday. Delp toured the Shaughnessy layout—7,590 yards—in 68 strokes, four under par, to gain a four-hole lead in the morning round and then fought off Cameron's challenges in the afternoon.

The only American ever to hold the title was Eddie Held of New York, who won it in 1929.
